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Part A: MOTIVATION REPORT

a) Introduction

1. Background

Vredehoek (including Devil's Peak Estate) is a suburb in Cape Town at the foot of Table Mountain and Devil's Peak. It is in the south-eastern corner of the city bowl with Oranjezicht and Gardens to the west, District Six across Philip Kgosana Drive (M3) to the north, and Table Mountain National Park to the south and east. It is a predominantly residential neighbourhood with a population of about 5400 (Census 2011), including a modest mix of residential-style commercial activity: cafés, restaurants, small grocery outlets, pet stores, and professional practices such as physiotherapists and doctor's rooms. Vredehoek includes two junior schools, a high school, a retirement village and a handful of places of worship. The area includes a mixture of free-standing residences and small to medium-sized apartment buildings. There is limited off-street parking, and many residents park their vehicles on the street.

Vredehoek is well-loved by its residents. It is a walkable suburb with multiple parks and easy access to Table Mountain. Residents describe it as an enjoyable place to live, conveniently situated at the edge of the city but retaining a suburban feel.

Vredehoek remains a highly desirable, walkable suburb with a strong community feel, but residents have become increasingly concerned about safety, crime, homelessness-related activity, and declining cleanliness. Muggings, burglaries, theft from vehicles, drug use in public spaces, attacks on people using Table Mountain, and the mess left after bin-picking all contribute to a growing sense that the neighbourhood is less secure and less well-managed than it once was. Drug use in parks, discarded needles, occasional aggressive behaviour, and illegal fires add further pressure, while Vredehoek's easy access to Table Mountain (which provides escape routes and hiding places for criminal elements), open, street-facing homes and limited off-street parking make residents especially exposed to these issues.

Most homelessness in the area is transient: people move through Vredehoek to and from Table Mountain and surrounding hotspots such as the Stroompie informal settlement. Vredehoek is also used as an escape route by criminals coming down off Table Mountain. Some streets have tried to self-fund camera projects, but they are fragmented, hard to manage, and ineffective without coordinated monitoring or

rapid response. Devil's Peak Vredehoek Neighbourhood Watch (DPVWatch) works hard but cannot scale on volunteer time and irregular donations.

The area now needs a structured, accountable mechanism with dedicated staff and reliable funding to address safety, cleanliness, and urban-management challenges consistently, otherwise public spaces will deteriorate, and the suburb's character will erode.

It is proposed that a City Improvement District (CID) is established in Vredehoek as described below. The goal is to establish a stable, reliable mechanism to fund dedicated staff and service providers who can provide supplementary services, in order to address the concerns of residents and maintain the quality of our neighbourhood.

A CID is a community-driven venture, allowing the local community, property owners and local businesses to organise and fund improvements of specific areas within the City. Once the application to establish a City Improvement District is approved by Council, a non-profit company (the "CID Company"), carries out the activities and improvements proposed in this business plan, funded by an additional rate levied on rateable property located within the CID.

The CID is proposed at a time when a majority of ratepayers have experienced sometimes significant increases in their rates, without a corresponding change in services (such as cleaning services). The business plan must therefore balance the needs of the community with affordability.

The CID will seek to strengthen, not replace, existing community structures. In implementing its public safety, cleaning, environmental and social programmes, the CID will coordinate where appropriate with DPVWatch, "friends of" park groups, community organisations, SAPS, City departments and neighbouring CIDs, while retaining accountability for services funded through the additional rate.

2. The name of the proposed district is **Vredehoek City Improvement District (Vredehoek CID)**.

The Steering Committee are volunteers and are not remunerated for their work. The Steering Committee is not able to procure or contract on behalf of the proposed CID. The Steering Committee members will not benefit financially from the establishment of the CID. If approved, all procurement and appointments for the CID must be made by the CID non-profit company under the CID By-law, CID Policy and applicable conflict-of-interest rules.

4. The vision, mission and goal for the CID

Vision: A safe, clean, and well-managed Vredehoek where residents can walk, live, and enjoy public spaces with confidence.

Mission: To strengthen Vredehoek's liveability through integrated safety, cleaning, and public-space management services that prevent deterioration and support a thriving community.

Goal: Improve public safety, responsibly address social concerns, and provide effective supplementary cleaning and support services that support the community's vision of Vredehoek and its public spaces.

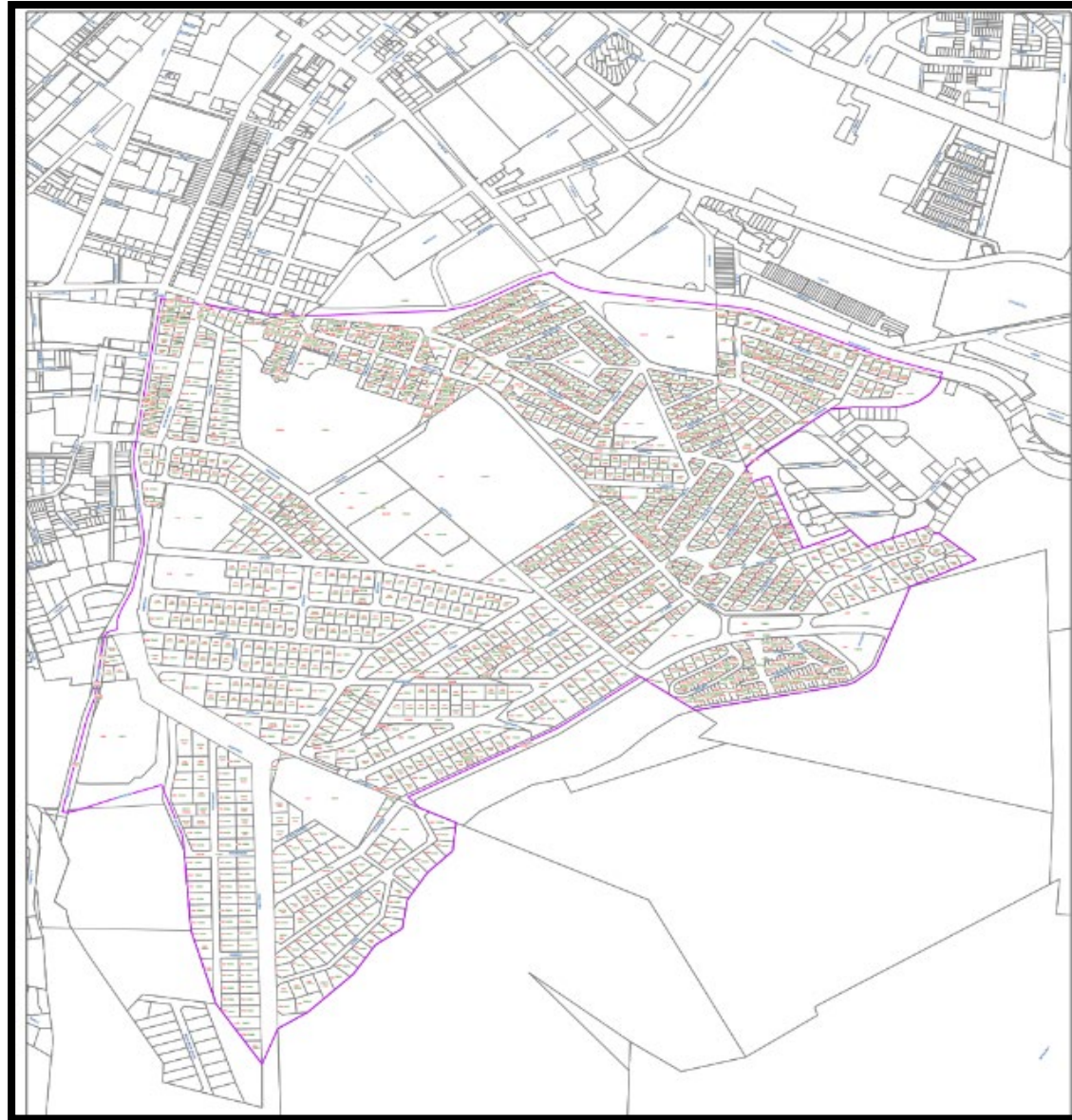
5. Defined geographical area of the CID.

The area of the CID is the suburb of Vredehoek and Devil's Peak Estate, including a few blocks of Oranjezicht, bounded by:

- Jutland Avenue/Philip Kgosana Drive to the north;
- Upper Buitenkant Street (becoming Gorge Street) to the west, with the inclusion of the area bounded by Schoonder, Prince and Flower Streets;
- Table Mountain National Park to the south and east excluding High Cape and Disa Park.

Geographical Boundary





This area was chosen because it is largely the boundary of Vredehoek (including Devil's Peak Estate) as defined by the City, and is very similar to the area covered by the Devil's Peak Vredehoek Neighbourhood Watch (DPVWatch). A few blocks of Oranjezicht near Gardens Center, bounded by Schoonder, Prince and Flower Streets are included by request of property owners in that area.

A benefit of the area being very similar to the DPVWatch area is that DPVWatch and its volunteer network have many years of practical, on-the-ground experience of the public space issues in the area. This experience has been a key contribution to the CID business plan.

The boundary was informed by the legal requirement that it must be clear, contiguous, and must not dissect individual properties. Boundary decisions have therefore been assessed with reference to public-space benefit, service feasibility, existing private or shared services, community alignment, affordability, the effect on the rates base, and the likelihood of obtaining the required support for the CID from affected property owners.

The boundary is a balance between an area that shares concerns and challenges, is large enough to support a reasonable budget without excessive ratepayer contributions, but small enough that the budget can reasonably provide effective services.

Disa Park and High Cape have been excluded because both are large (consist of more than 175 units each), self-contained complexes on the outer edge of the proposed boundary, each with a secured perimeter, single monitored access point and formally coordinated, area-wide security service. High Cape owners already contribute towards homeowners associations that provide additional services in the area. Including these areas may increase budget (and potentially lower the rate-in-the-rand by a small amount), but would also raise costs for the supplementary services required to cover the additional area e.g. security patrols and cleaning teams. That added cost would largely offset any reduction in the rate-in-the-rand, so the net benefit to existing Additional Rate Payers (ARP) is limited, with an additional burden on reaching the 60% consent threshold increasing.

Excluding these areas improves the feasibility of the CID by ensuring stronger alignment, participation, and support from affected property owners at inception. Once established, the CID may consider a future boundary amendment if affected property owners request it and the amendment is feasible under the CID By-law and Policy.

6. Strategic objectives

The Urban Management Survey identified public safety as the primary concern of ratepayers. The strategic objectives of the proposed CID are therefore centred on improving public safety across Vredehoek's public spaces. The other CID service areas are necessary and important in their own right, but they also directly support this primary objective by improving the lawful, safe and confident use of streets and green spaces, reducing disorder, and ensuring that public spaces are visibly and consistently managed.

The strategic objectives of the proposed CID are to:

6.1. improve public safety through coordinated 24/7 vehicle patrols, daytime foot patrols, 24/7 street camera monitoring of key entry and exit points, routes and hotspots, and coordinated response with relevant public safety partners;

6.2 maintain and cleanse public areas, particularly after refuse collection days and in parks and green spaces, so that public spaces are cleaner, safer and more usable;

6.3 support environmental development through targeted improvements to parks, green spaces and public areas that encourage lawful and safe use and community confidence; and

6.4 reduce the negative impact of social issues in public spaces through structured social engagement, referral, supervision and upliftment opportunities, integrated with the CID's cleaning and public safety operations.

7. Core Values

The core values of the Vredehoek CID and its management body will be:

- **Reliability:** deliver services consistently and on time
- **Accountability:** own outcomes, report clearly, fix failures
- **Transparency:** communicate openly and honestly
- **Advocacy:** tenaciously represent the best interests of the community at all times
- **Responsiveness:** act quickly and follow through

8. Why the Area Needs a CID

While Vredehoek remains a highly desirable, walkable suburb with strong community identity, over the past several years there has been a growing concern from residents around safety and security, violent muggings, burglaries, theft from and of vehicles, drug abuse in public spaces, and cleanliness after bin days to due bin-pickers. These factors contribute to a steady decline in the sense of security and order in the neighbourhood.

Rough sleeping brings multiple pressures, such as illegal structures, fires, and drug use in parks where discarded needles pose risks to pets and people. Aggressive, violent (sometimes drug-fueled) and anti-social behaviour from some rough sleepers puts residents at risk and creates unsafe conditions outside homes and shops. Residents raise concerns about mess after bin days, when people pick through bins and leave rubbish scattered across streets and green spaces, made worse by Vredehoek's strong summer winds.

While there are a few rough sleepers who live in the area and are well-known, there are not (yet) significant collections of permanent illegal structures. Rather, the area acts as a thorough-fare for people who live on Table Mountain in Vredehoek Quarry and Deer Park (both identified as problem areas by SANParks). It is also used as an escape route into the City by criminals targeting hikers and poaching plants

on Table Mountain. Just north of Vredehoek, over the M3, is the Stroompie informal settlement which is of significant concern to residents. Many perpetrators flee into or through Stroompie, and the City has been unable to effectively manage this area.

Vredehoek is not a suburban community of large properties and high fences. Most properties are modest, face directly onto the street, and have limited off-street parking. Neighbours know each other and there is a strong sense of community. Shops, restaurants, Table Mountain, parks, schools, churches and the City itself are within walking distance, and residents should be able to walk and participate in clean public spaces without fear or harassment.

Some streets have funded street-camera monitoring projects. These are difficult to launch and manage, costs aren't always fairly shared, and the monitoring and responses aren't coordinated across the suburb. This makes it difficult to track perpetrators as they move through the area or down off Table Mountain. The lack of a dedicated response vehicle also leads to slow response times of 20+ minutes, when an effective response needs to arrive within less than five minutes.

Similarly, residents living near Plantation Park have in the last few years worked hard to prevent drug abuse, fires, illegal occupation and other dangerous behaviours in Plantation Park, in an effort to make the space safe and usable by the community. This is a key thoroughfare for criminals moving to/from Stroompie into Vredehoek. Friends of Plantation Park have privately funded camera installations, cleaning and patrols of the park. While they have had success, the future of Plantation Park and the management of criminal elements that enter through it, relies on additional fundraising and the efforts of two or three individuals, which puts it at risk.

These problems cannot be solved on a house-by-house or street-by-street basis. They must be solved holistically and through integration with surrounding communities and initiatives, with a sustainable business model.

Devil's Peak Vredehoek Neighbourhood Watch (DPVWatch) is widely trusted and provides support where it can, but their capacity is limited and heavily dependent on a small pool of volunteers and irregular donations. DPVWatch cannot scale to meet the current needs of residents.

Vredehoek requires a structured, dependable, accountable mechanism with dedicated staff and consistent funding to address safety, cleanliness, and urban-management issues at the scale residents expect. Otherwise, crime and rough sleeping will continue to rise, we will stop using our public spaces and we will lose them, and the neighbourhood will decline.

Three focus areas will help to address the primary safety and cleanliness concerns of residents (as expressed in the Urban Management Survey):

1. 24x7 street camera monitoring at key points with dedicated 24x7 response vehicles
2. Management of rough sleeping through compassionate and support-focused interventions
3. Social upliftment and additional cleaning services that provide job opportunities to local homeless people and keep public spaces clean

The CID will have direct representation on the City's Ward and Subcouncil committees, and direct access to the City's line departments. This gives Vredehoek a stronger voice in the City, in addition to our elected ward councillor.

The CID and DPVWatch

This business plan has been developed with significant engagement from DPVWatch and various watch-related volunteers. It is expected that DPVWatch and the CID, if launched, will work together, with DPVWatch both providing support and holding the CID accountable. The CID and DPVWatch would remain independent, and the watch may continue or adapt its operations based on community needs.

A CID would reduce the financial and operational pressures on DPVWatch's volunteers, and reduce the need for DPVWatch volunteers to be first responders to safety incidents. The future of DPVWatch without the CID is uncertain, as it has struggled for years to raise sufficient funds and relies heavily on a few core volunteers.

9. Urban Management Survey

To inform the Business Plan, the Steering Committee conducted an Urban Management Survey (UMS) during September and October of 2025 that received 719 valid responses. A supplementary survey was conducted for the addition of the Schoonder/Prince St area during February 2026 that received 66 valid responses. Collectively, these 785 responses represent 25% of ratepayers in the CID area. The survey provides a clear picture of current concerns, needs, and priorities directly from the community.

Residents identified safety, the negative impact of people sleeping rough on the streets, and cleanliness of public spaces as the dominant issues requiring attention.

Demographics

- 52% of respondents are between 35 and 54, and 91% of respondents are 35 or older.
- Respondents are split approximately equally between male and female.
- 62% of respondents own a house, 36% own an apartment.

Concerns

Safety is a major concern for residents, particularly on the streets and in public spaces.

- Very few respondents feel completely safe, or not safe at all
- 37% of respondents feel completely or somewhat safe, 37% are neutral, and 26% feel somewhat unsafe or not safe at all
- DPVWatch, private security firms and camera monitoring are largely considered effective security measures
- SAPS is considered ineffective by 65% of respondents, and effective by only 10%

The primary concerns of respondents relate to safety and security, and the negative aspects of people sleeping rough on the streets. Issues frequently mentioned include crime, cleanliness, bin picking, begging, and drug abuse. Safety in public spaces emerges as a significant worry, with homelessness widely perceived as a major contributing factor.

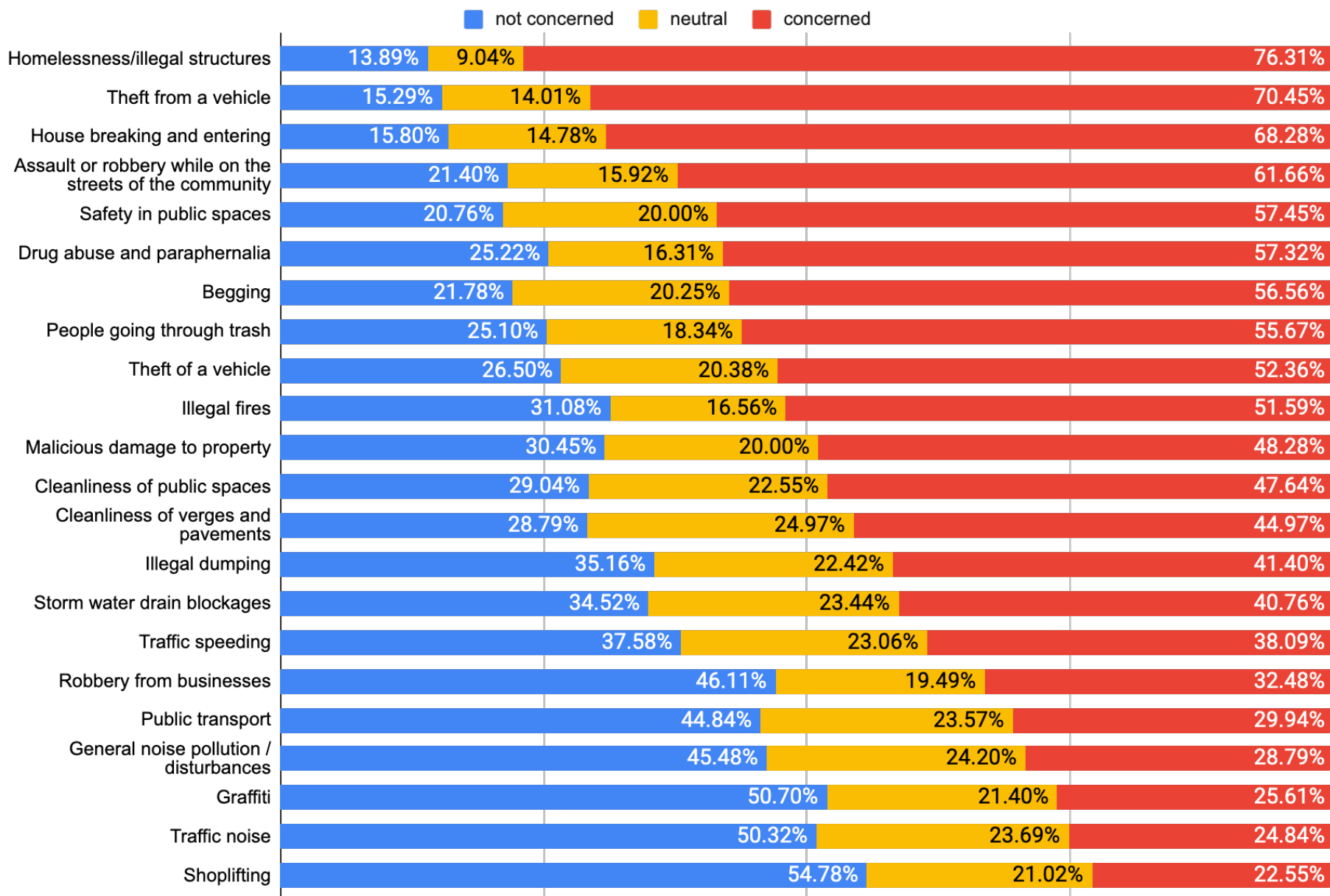
While house breaking and entering is one of the top 3 concerns, 85% of houses (43% of apartments) have armed response and only 19% of those without are considering getting it in the next year. **Theft from** a vehicle is of much greater concern than **theft of** a vehicle. Off-street parking is not common in Vredehoek and again this speaks to safety on the streets. After safety and homelessness (and related factors), cleanliness of public spaces is the next biggest concern.

Key concerns (see chart)

10 (of 22) issues are rated as somewhat or very concerning by 50% or more of respondents. These issues are largely (although not always) inter-related.

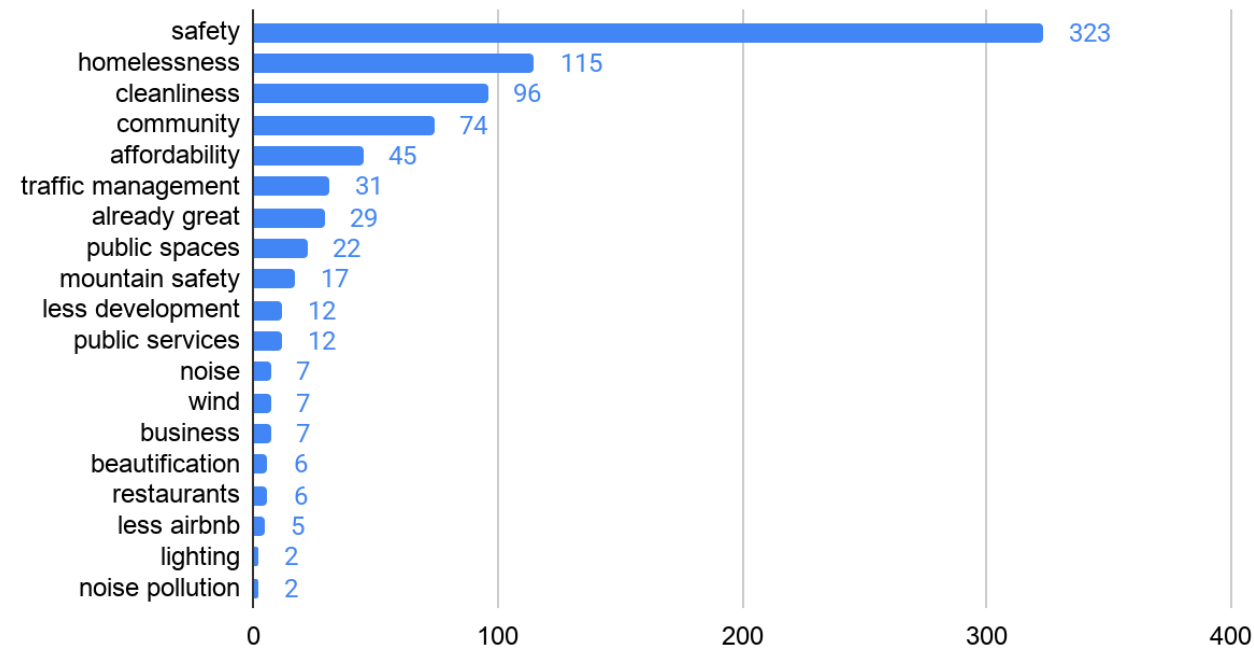
- Homelessness/vagrancy/illegal structures
- Theft from a vehicle
- House breaking and entering
- Assault or robbery while on the streets of the community
- Safety in public spaces
- Drug abuse and paraphernalia
- Begging
- People going through trash
- Illegal fires
- Theft of a vehicle

Concerns

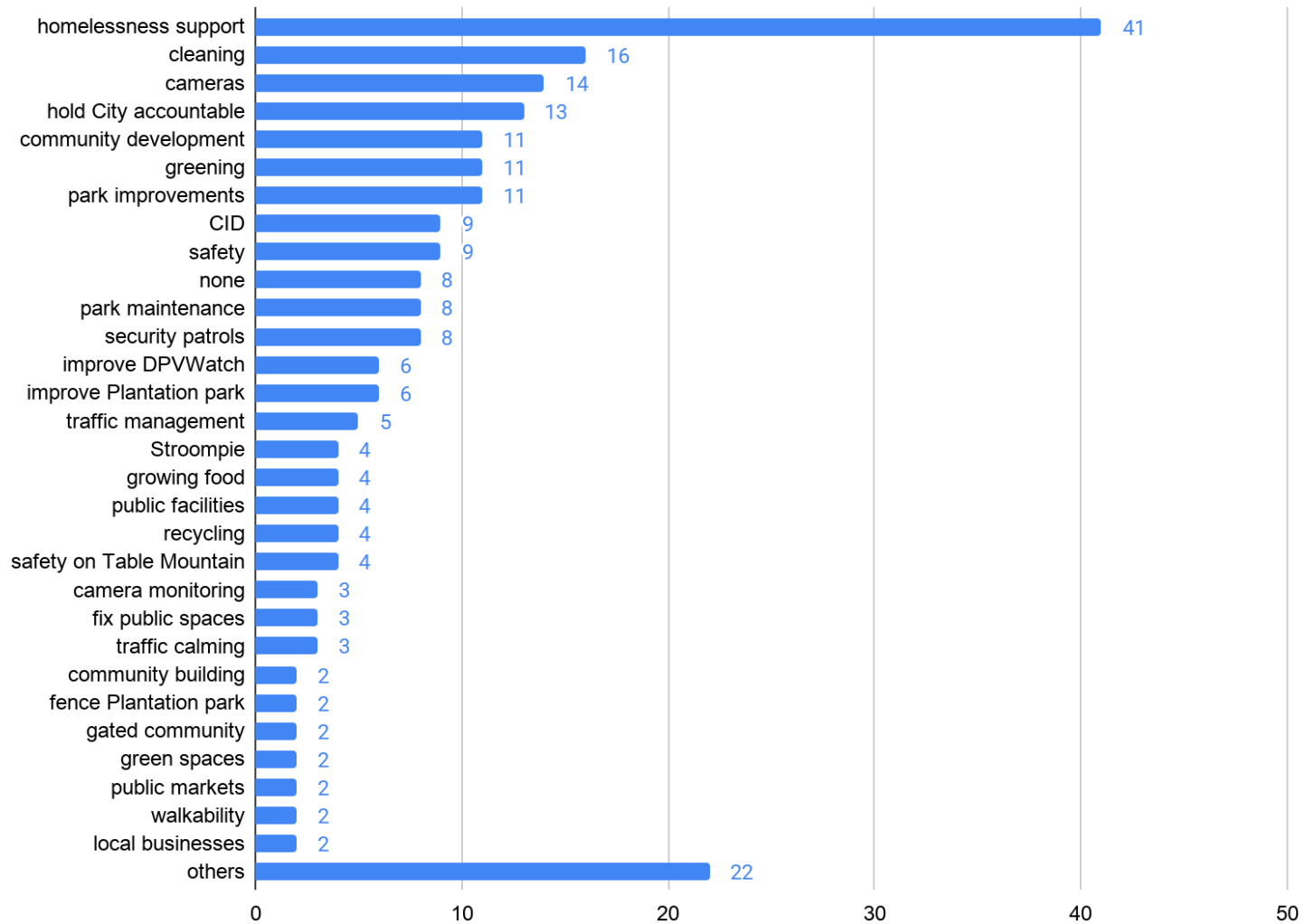


Responses to the free-form survey questions reflect a neighbourhood that cares about safety and community, and knows that the homelessness problem can only be solved through supportive interventions that acknowledge the reality and difficulty of the situation.

b) Proposed Services and/or Projects

10. Residents identified safety, rough sleeping and its negative impacts, and cleanliness of public spaces as the dominant issues requiring attention.

These issues are largely inter-related and the CID proposes a strategic combination of services to address them. Public safety is the highest priority issue that the CID must address, and all public space management services build towards this objective, where possible.

10.1 Public safety

- 24x7 public safety vehicle patrols, two vehicles with one officer each. Patrols are directly linked to camera monitoring for rapid response to issues.
- Two foot patrollers during the day, 7 days of the week, to supplement vehicle patrols.
- 24x7 monitoring of street cameras that provide coverage of key points across Vredehoek, taking over the cost of monitoring up to 200 relevant and suitable cameras from residents, and installing up to 100 new cameras as required.
- The camera feeds are watched live, in real time, by trained operators in a dedicated control room. When an operator spots something suspicious, they can immediately alert the CID's patrols to respond directly, rather than the incident only being noticed after the fact.
- Taking over the cost of running existing License Plate Recognition (LPR) cameras from DPVWatch. LPR cameras automatically flag vehicles of interest (e.g. reported stolen) as they enter the boundary area, allowing for a co-ordinated response to suspicious activity.
- Contracting a Law Enforcement Officer from the City with the power to enforce compliance with by-laws and issue fines as permitted by the by-laws. For example, traffic offences, noise disturbances and other public safety contraventions, and responding quickly to new illegal structures erected in public spaces.

10.2 Integrated maintenance, cleansing, and social engagement programme

- Urban maintenance coordination with City departments to improve the condition, safety and usability of public infrastructure
- Proactive identification, reporting and tracking of public infrastructure defects in partnership with City departments
- Targeted supplementary maintenance, undertaken with City approval, to fast-track minor repairs such as small potholes.
- Contracting an accredited third-party service provider to deliver an integrated programme combining public-space cleaning, engagement with homeless individuals, and employment-linked upliftment.
- Deployment of a dedicated cleaning team operating on weekdays with cleaning schedules aligned to refuse collection days.
- Proactive engagement with people sleeping rough in public spaces to reduce disorder, prevent the establishment of illegal structures, and manage high-risk areas.
- Use of structured, paid work within the cleaning programme as a stabilising intervention for selected individuals, supported through peer mentoring and social-work oversight.
- Coordination with relevant City departments, shelters, health services, and NGOs to facilitate access to appropriate support services.
- Escalation of hazardous waste and high-risk situations through established CID and municipal channels.

10.3 Environmental development

1. Securing and supporting the legal and safe use of public and green spaces, including
 - a. Contributing to the fencing of Plantation Park
 - b. Fencing along Jutland Ave
 - c. Adding a fence and an access gate for pedestrians and motor vehicles at the end of Pinoak Road
 - d. Extending the fence of Virginia Park

10.4 CID management and coordination

2. Appointment of a full-time CID Manager and a part-time Assistant to oversee service providers, manage contracts, and ensure accountability.
3. A CID office in the Vredehoek area from which operations will be conducted.
4. Coordination with the City, DPVWatch, SAPS, SANParks, and surrounding neighbourhoods.
5. Statutory reporting, financial management, and communication with members and the broader community.

(i) Improving Public Safety

11.1 Proposed services and/or projects

Objectives

- Improve safety and security in public spaces through visible security presence, monitoring and rapid response
- Visible vehicle and foot patrols to reduce opportunistic crimes and petty theft
- Effective and rapid response to security issues in public spaces through dedicated patrol vehicles with a response-time service-level agreement (SLA)
- Enable effective and coordinated responses to public safety incidents involving the CID, camera monitoring, patrol services, City Law Enforcement, SAPS, SANParks, DPVWatch and community safety structures
- Strengthen the enforcement of City by-laws in public spaces and enable faster and more consistent responses to by-law infringements and public space misuse

Short, medium and long-term goals

1. Short term (year 1): Stabilisation

- a. Stabilise public safety conditions by halting the rise of incidents in public spaces.
- b. Establish a visible and consistent public safety presence that clearly signals active monitoring, patrols and enforcement.
- c. Establish and refine an effective public safety approach for the CID that matches local conditions and priorities.
- d. Address known hotspots and persistent issues through focused patrols, camera coverage and by-law enforcement.

2. Medium term (years 2 - 4): Reduction and Adaptation

- a. Achieve a sustained downward trend in public safety incidents and public space disorder.
- b. Refine patrol patterns, camera coverage and enforcement priorities based on operational data and on-the-ground experience.
- c. Adapt the public safety approach to evolving risks and behaviours as the area stabilises and baseline conditions improve.

3. Long term (4+ years): Normalisation and Confidence

- a. Maintain a neighbourhood where public spaces are widely and confidently used by residents and visitors without fear
- b. Embed public safety as a normalised, preventative function focused on early intervention rather than crisis response
- c. Support a stable, orderly public environment that reinforces community confidence, social use of public spaces and long-term neighbourhood resilience against unlawfulness.

Services and projects

The CID's public safety strategy is based on an integrated model combining camera monitoring, visible 24x7 patrols, rapid response and lawful enforcement. These components operate in coordination through a central control room to ensure effective information sharing, escalation and response.

The public safety model comprises the following components:

- 24x7 camera monitoring of entry points, key routes and public space hotspots
- 24x7 public safety vehicle patrols providing visible presence and rapid response
- A dedicated City of Cape Town Law Enforcement Officer focusing on by-law enforcement

Street camera monitoring and control room

- 24x7 automated and human monitoring of up street cameras at key points across the CID.
- Monitoring services will be outsourced to a third-party service provider appointed through a fair, open and transparent procurement process.
- The camera monitoring service provider will operate a control room that serves as the central coordination and escalation point for public safety activities within the CID.
- The control room will coordinate information and responses between camera monitoring, patrol vehicles, CID staff, City Law Enforcement, SAPS, SANParks, DPVWatch and surrounding neighbourhood watches.
- CID staff will have radios to communicate directly with the patrol vehicles.
- Radio communications will also include or co-operate with DPVWatch to ensure effective coordination.
- Where appropriate, the CID may assume responsibility for monitoring suitable existing resident-installed cameras, subject to technical and legal feasibility and owner consent (see section 11 below).
- Installation of up to 100 additional street cameras to be undertaken over time to address coverage gaps, where necessary.
- Planned target areas for camera monitoring are described in more detail in section 11 below.

Vehicle and foot patrols

- 24x7 public safety vehicle patrols, two vehicles with one officer each.
- 2 foot patrollers during the day, on 8 hour shifts, 7 days a week.
- Patrol services will be outsourced to a third party provider that will be appointed through a fair, open and transparent process.
- The patrol vehicles will be equipped with a secure compartment for the lawful transport of suspects.
- The patrol officers will not carry a firearm but will have necessary safety equipment.
- The patrol service provider will make an armed backup vehicle available to respond when needed.
- The vehicles will actively patrol throughout the Vredehoek area, 24x7, and will be available to respond to public safety issues identified through camera monitoring, CID reporting channels or community alerts.
- Patrols are directly linked to the control room for rapid and coordinated responses to issues.
- Patrols will coordinate with DPVWatch and neighbouring CIDs where relevant, including coordination with the Lower Gardens CID in adjacent public spaces (such as Mill Street Bridge).
- Patrol vehicles and personnel will be clearly identifiable through Vredehoek CID branding.
- The service provider must ensure that staff have appropriate shift rotations to ensure the safety and well-being of the patrollers and compliance with employment regulations. Possible shift structures include:
 - Two shifts with 12 hour work days, following a 4 days on/4 days off pattern; or
 - Three shifts with 8 hour work days.
- Shift changes must be staggered to avoid lulls in monitoring during shift changes. Shift changes should also ideally not overlap with those of other security services, such as Law Enforcement, SAPS, armed response, etc.

License Plate Recognition (LPR) cameras

- The responsibility and cost of running existing License Plate Recognition (LPR) cameras, currently handled by DPVWatch, will be taken over entirely by the CID. This will relieve the DPVWatch of the need to fundraise for this cost.
- LPR cameras are part of the City's LPR network and are monitored by a third party. LPR cameras do not form part of the standard camera monitoring system and are not monitored by the street camera monitoring provider.
- Provision is made for the installation or replacement of up to 4 new LPR cameras over the next 5 years.

Law Enforcement Officer

- The CID will contract the services of a dedicated Law Enforcement Officer from the City.
- The Law Enforcement Officer remains a City employee, operating under City authority and command, and will be deployed within the CID
- The Law Enforcement Officer will work with a mix of standard working hours and weekends/overnight (at overtime rates), subject to City approval and operational requirements.
- The Law Enforcement Officer travels with one of the patrol vehicles.
- The Law Enforcement Officer can enforce the City's by-laws and has the power to issue fines and, in some cases, make arrests.
- The focus of the Law Enforcement Officer will include:
 - Enforcement of City by-laws in public spaces
 - Issuing fines and compliance notices
 - Addressing illegal structures, public space obstructions and repeat by-law infringements
 - Assisting with traffic-related by-law enforcement and public-space access issues, including illegal parking, obstructions and congestion hotspots where these fall within the Law Enforcement Officer's mandate.
 - The Law Enforcement Officer is able to perform these services, while private security providers are not.

- The Law Enforcement Officer carries a firearm.
- The Law Enforcement Officer will work in coordination with CID staff, patrols, City departments and relevant community safety structures to ensure effective information sharing and escalation.

Experience from other CIDs indicates that these measures can improve public-space management, response coordination, cleanliness and confidence when they are consistently implemented over time. The Pinelands CID reports¹ reductions in housebreaking (31.51%), robbery (44.44%), theft from motor vehicles (57.38%) and theft of motor vehicles (77.78%) for November 2024 to June 2025 compared with the same period a year earlier. In Llandudno, local incident data records 42 incidents in 2013, falling to five in 2019, with six and ten incidents recorded in 2023 and 2024². In Cape Town's CBD, the CCID reported³ that crime-related incidents logged by its 24-hour control room fell by 35%, from 1186 to 773, between the equivalent periods in 2024 and 2025.

DPVWatch will remain independent of the CID. The CID will coordinate with DPVWatch where appropriate, including through information sharing, escalation and public-safety coordination. Whether DPVWatch continues in its current form, adapts its role, or reduces activity over time will remain a decision for DPVWatch and the wider community.

CID patrols are only allowed to provide services in public spaces, and residents should not assume that the CID replaces private armed response for alarm activations or incidents on private property.

11.2 Areas within the CID boundaries

Vehicle patrols, Law Enforcement Officer and LPR cameras

- Vehicle patrols will be conducted throughout the CID area.
- The Law Enforcement Officer will monitor issues in all public areas of the CID.
- LPR cameras will remain in their existing positions, targeting road entry and exit points.

Street cameras

The short- and medium-term focus of the street camera monitoring will be on monitoring key entry and exit points into the area, primary movement routes, access points to and from Table Mountain, and selected internal streets identified as public safety priorities. Camera coverage will be reviewed and refined over time based on operational experience, incident data and changing conditions within the CID.

The below description of priority monitoring areas is a guide based on survey results and current incidents in the CID area. Once the CID is established, it will produce a Public Safety strategy and management plan which will take into account security priorities and a survey of existing cameras. The plan will detail the streets and areas that are high priorities for camera monitoring, which existing cameras are necessary and suitable to integrate into the monitoring network, and where new cameras should be installed.

Focus areas

Initially, camera monitoring will prioritise locations with the greatest impact on public safety and movement into and through the CID area. This includes:

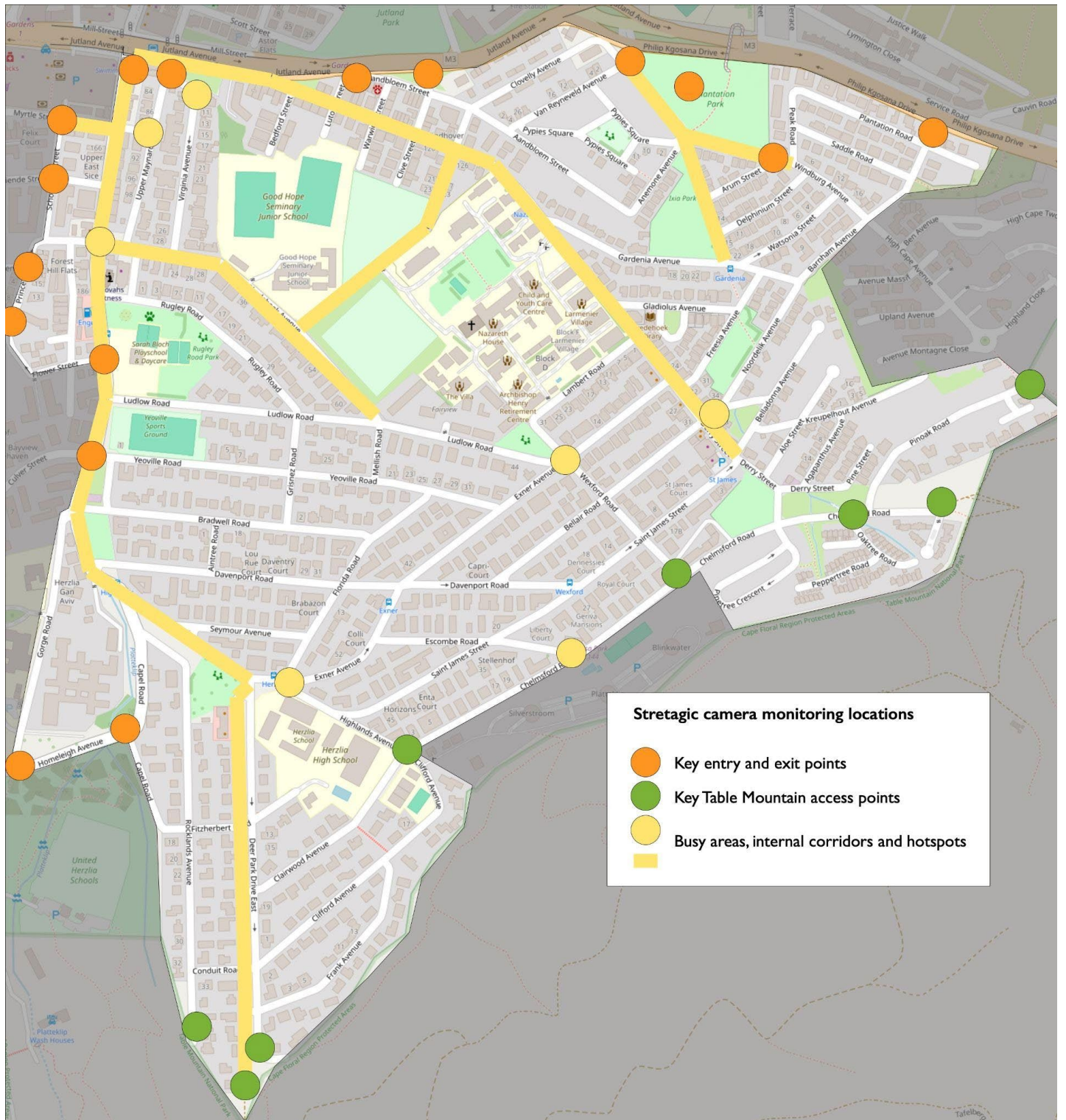
- Key entry and exit points into the CID
 - Upper Buitenkant St at Gardens Center / Upper Mill St
 - Upper Maynard St at Virginia Ave (at Virginia Park)
 - Aandbloem St along Jutland Ave and at Clive St
 - Philip Kgosana Dr at Crassula Ave / Van Ryneveld Ave
 - Plantation Park (in co-operation with Friends of Plantation Park)
 - Windburg Ave at Peak Rd
 - Philip Kgosana Dr at Barnham Ave
 - Homeleigh Ave at Capel Rd and Gorge Rd
 - Upper Buitenkant St at Culver St / Yeoville Rd
 - Prince St at Flower St and Jagersfontein Ave
 - Schoonder St at Prince St and Myrtle St
- Access points to and from Table Mountain
 - Controlling and monitoring access to Table Mountain is a challenge, as there are multiple access points and many of them are where a road ends and simply gives way to TMNP land (ie. there are not formal access controls). TMNP staff have raised that Vredehoek Quarry and the Deer Park area are problem spots and they welcome the support of a CID to assist them in managing crime.

- Key access points for the community are:
 - the eastern end of Chelmsford Road, which includes access to multiple mountain trails and the Vredehoek Quarry
 - the southern ends of Rocklands Rd and Deer Park Drive, which include access to multiple mountain trails.
- Ensuring good camera coverage of these areas will enable improved monitoring and response, and is essential for effective crime management with TMNP staff along these borders.
- End of Pinoak Rd
- Eastern end of Chelmsford Rd at the starting point of the mountain trails
- Chelmsford Rd at Oaktree Rd
- Chelmsford Rd at Wexford Rd
- Chelmsford Rd at Escombe Rd
- Chelmsford Rd at Highlands Ave
- Southern end of Rocklands Rd and Deer Park Dr at the entrance to Deer Park





- Busy commercial areas, high-traffic streets, internal corridors and other hotspots with recurring incidents
 - Garden's Center
 - Upper Buitenkant St from Upper Mill St to Myrtle St and Vriende St
 - Myrtle St from Schoonder St to Upper Buitenkant St
 - Mill St bridge and skate park, and Virginia Ave Park
 - Lower Upper Mill St (Garden's Center up to Derry St)
 - Derry St
 - Derry St at the Spar
 - Vredehoek Ave
 - Chelsea Ave
 - Upper Buitenkant Ave up to Deer Park Drive
 - Deer Park Drive
 - The junction of Wexford Rd, Exner Ave and Ludlow Rd
 - The junction of Exner Ave, Highlands Ave and Florida Rd
 - The junction of Vredehoek Ave and Upper Buitenkant St



As the CID matures and operational data becomes available, camera coverage will be expanded and refined to address coverage gaps within the CID area, and evolving public safety needs. Over time, this may include:

- Filling coverage gaps on internal streets where incident patterns or movement data indicate increased risk
- Adjusting camera placement in response to changes in behaviour, displacement effects or new development
- Improving continuity of coverage between entry points, internal routes and public space nodes
- Rebalancing coverage between preventative surveillance and targeted hotspot monitoring

Use of existing street-facing cameras

- There are over 150 existing street-facing cameras in the area, operated by individuals or community initiatives, that are monitored by a variety of service providers. While these cameras have proved important for incident alerts, there is limited coordination between service providers, limited coordination between monitoring and response vehicles, and no central mechanism for tracking individuals through the area and efficient sharing of footage to assist with incident response and follow-up.
- The CID intends to assume responsibility for the monitoring and coordination of approximately 200 of the existing cameras subject to technical suitability and the consent of property owners.
- Not all existing cameras within the CID area will necessarily be included in the CID monitoring network. Inclusion will be based on strategic value, coverage needs, technical and legal considerations, and consent of property owners.
- The exact cameras will be identified as part of the Public Safety strategy and management plan to be produced once the CID is established, taking into account security priorities and changes to installed cameras since this business plan was developed.

Installation of additional street-facing cameras

- Over the five-year term of the CID, the CID will fund the installation of additional street-facing cameras to address coverage gaps, up to 100 new cameras (for an approximate total of 300) with indicative targets of 40 (year 1), 20 (year 2), 20 (year 3), 10 (year 4) and 10 (year 5) additional or replacement cameras per year.
- Most cameras are expected to be installed on private property with the consent of property owners. The CID will cover the costs of installation and monitoring, while property owners will remain responsible for providing electricity and internet connectivity. This is currently the case for shared camera monitoring initiatives in various areas of Vredehoek.
- Ownership, physical control and maintenance of cameras installed on private property will remain with the relevant property owners, unless otherwise agreed.

Public safety controls

Public safety patrols and public-space management must be implemented lawfully, proportionately and without unfair discrimination. All contracted security personnel must be registered with the Private Security Industry Regulatory Authority (PSIRA), appropriately trained and vetted, and required to comply with PSIRA's Code of Conduct. Patrols, monitoring and enforcement activity should be based on conduct, specific incidents or objectively identified risk, while protecting lawful access to public streets, parks and Table Mountain routes.

Camera privacy and data governance

The purpose of centralised monitoring is to improve coordination and accountability compared with fragmented private camera arrangements, while maintaining an appropriate balance between safety and privacy.

Camera monitoring will be limited to legitimate public-safety and incident-response purposes in public spaces within the CID. The CID will require its camera monitoring service provider to comply with POPIA and all applicable legal requirements, and to operate under a written service agreement approved by the CID.

The service agreement must address purpose limitation, access control, retention and deletion periods, audit logs, incident-based release of footage, secure storage, signage where required, contractor obligations, and escalation to SAPS, City Law Enforcement or other authorised bodies. Access to live feeds and stored footage must be limited to authorised personnel and used only for approved public-safety purposes.

Where the CID receives, uses or stores information from third-party systems, including LPR-related information, the CID will apply appropriate controls to that information while recognising that externally controlled systems remain subject to their own responsible parties and governance arrangements.

Before expanded camera monitoring is implemented, the CID will adopt and publish an appropriate CCTV and camera data governance policy. The CID will oversee the camera-monitoring arrangements and may require periodic reporting from the service provider.

11.4 Allocation of resources

Vehicle and foot patrols will cover the entire CID area.

The short- and medium-term focus of the street camera monitoring will be on monitoring key entry and exit points into the area, primary movement routes, access points to and from Table Mountain, and selected internal streets identified as public safety priorities. These areas are described in the section above. Camera coverage will be reviewed and refined over time based on operational experience, incident data and changing conditions within the CID.

The Law Enforcement Officer will monitor all public spaces of the CID.

(ii) Maintenance and Cleansing

12.1 Proposed services and/or projects

Cleanliness and maintenance of public spaces are the next biggest concerns of residents, after public safety and the negative impacts of homelessness. Improvement of public spaces also contributes to and supports safety in public spaces, by helping to ensure that they are used safely and legally.

Maintenance

Objectives

- Improve the condition, safety and usability of public infrastructure within the CID through proactive monitoring and coordination with the City
- Reduce maintenance backlogs and response times by identifying, prioritising and escalating issues to the relevant municipal service departments
- Support safer pedestrian and vehicular movement by ensuring that defects in roads, pavements, lighting and road markings are addressed quickly and effectively

Services and projects

- The CID will support the maintenance of public infrastructure within the area by coordinating with City departments and providing limited supplementary services when necessary.
- Public infrastructure issues to be monitored include: potholes, damaged road surfaces, uneven pavements, missing or faded road markings, non-functioning street lighting, blocked stormwater infrastructure and deteriorating minor public amenities (e.g. public bins and park benches)
- The CID will focus on the early identification, reporting, prioritisation and tracking of maintenance issues in public spaces, working in partnership with the relevant City service departments.
- The CID will not duplicate or replace municipal services, but will supplement them through active monitoring, formal communication channels and, where appropriate, limited supplementary interventions.
- Supplementary interventions will be undertaken with the City's consent and in accordance with agreed protocols and memoranda of understanding signed with the relevant departments.

It is common for CIDs to sign Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs) with City departments to allow the CID to provide supplementary services. These services will be provided by the CID's cleaning service provider (see next section) under the training and supervision of the relevant departments. In some cases the materials required will be provided by the departments.

For example, the CID will sign an agreement with the City's Roads and Stormwater department under which the CID's cleaning team will be trained on how to repair small potholes. The department will then provide the CID with the materials to repair small potholes, the work will be carried out by the CID's trained cleaning service provider, and the repairs are inspected and approved by the department.

This maintenance function supplements the City's existing services in situations where the City would take longer to resolve an issue than the community would like, the cost is limited, and the CID has the motivation, means and budget to do so.

Cleansing

Objectives

- Reduce litter, waste, and debris in streets, pavements, parks, and public spaces.
- Mitigate the negative impact of bin-picking, particularly after refuse collection days.
- Remove hazardous waste, including needles and other drug-related paraphernalia, from public areas.
- Remove weeds to ensure roadsides, pavements and verges are attractive and well-maintained.
- Provide additional, storm-specific stormwater drain clearing ahead of forecast severe weather, supplementing the City's routine maintenance schedule to reduce flood risk to roads and properties
- Improve the day-to-day cleanliness and usability of public spaces through visible, consistent cleaning services.

Services and projects

The CID will contract an accredited third-party NGO service provider to deliver a structured cleaning programme across the CID area. The programme is designed to provide consistent, visible cleaning services while also creating employment opportunities linked to social upliftment.

- A cleaning team of six members working half-day shifts will provide cleaning services seven days per week covering streets, pavements, parks, and green spaces across the CID. Individual cleaners will work a maximum of five days per week, with staggered shifts ensuring consistent daily coverage and increased capacity on higher-demand days.
- All areas in the CID will be cleaned once a week.
- The cleaning team will wear CID-branded high-visibility vests.
- Cleaning schedules will be aligned with municipal refuse collection days to ensure effective post-bin-day cleanup and reduce the impact of bin-picking.
- Cleaning focuses on pavements, streets and parks, including litter and dog waste, as well as the removal of weeds from pavements and kerbs.
- CCT Waste Services Department can collect the cleaning team's filled refuse bags daily from a single collection point.
- Where hazardous waste such as needles is identified, the cleaning team will escalate via the CID control room for appropriate handling by the relevant municipal department.

The cleaning team will be supported and supervised by outreach and peer-support staff provided by the same service provider. This ensures daily oversight, accountability, and continuity, while allowing cleaning staff to be supported within a structured work environment.

The cleaning team will also be responsible for supplementary minor maintenance tasks as described in the Maintenance section above.

Integration with social support services

The cleaning programme forms part of an integrated urban-management approach, operating in close coordination with the CID's social engagement programme. Employment opportunities within the cleaning team are used as a stabilising intervention for selected individuals living on the street, supported through peer mentoring and social-work oversight as described under Promotion of Social and Economic Development.

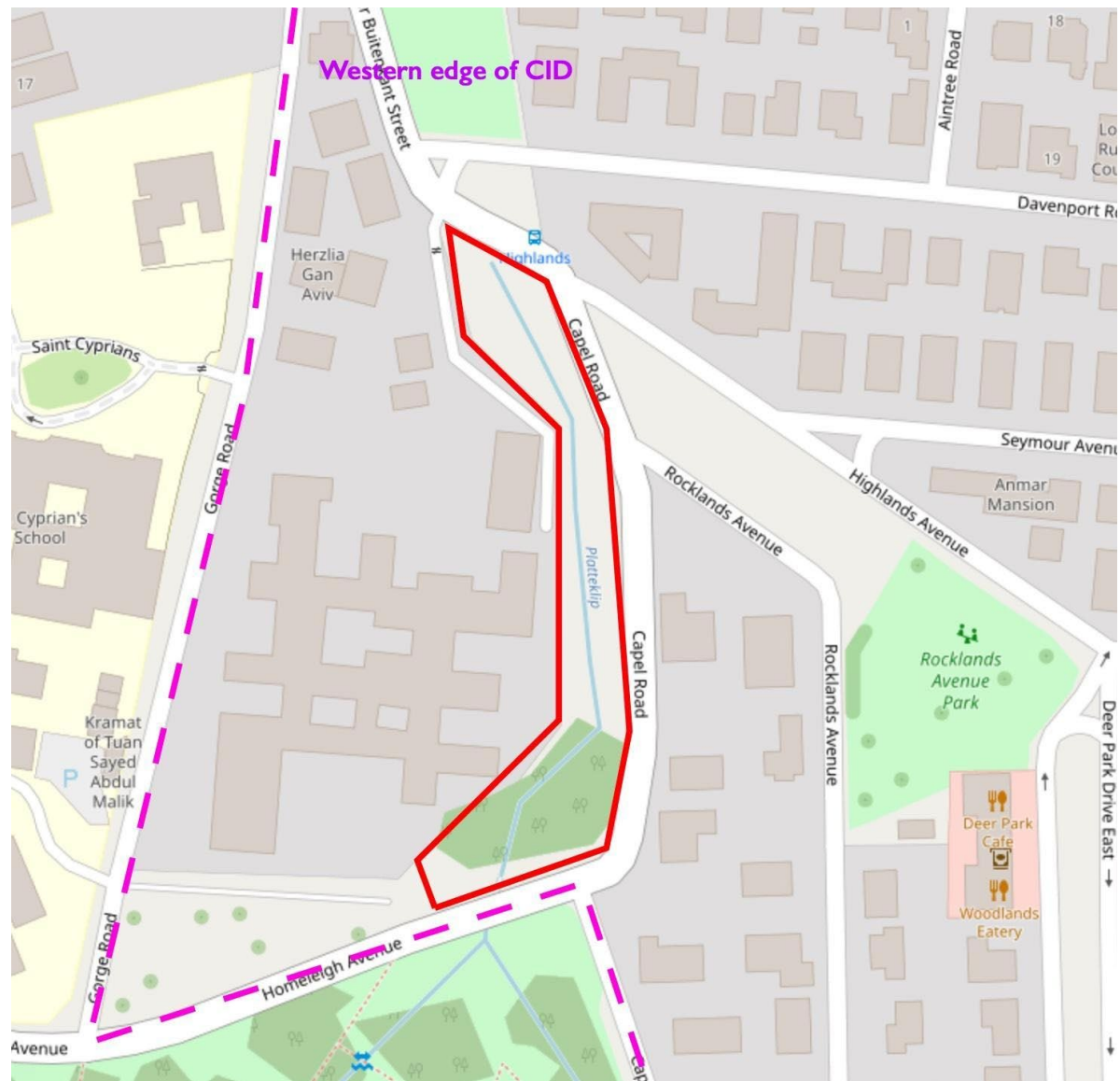
12.2 Areas within the CID boundaries

Maintenance monitoring and supplementary services will be provided across the entire CID area.

Cleaning services will be delivered across the entire CID area on a rotational basis, with prioritisation informed by refuse collection schedules, public events, seasonal conditions, and identified hotspots. Particular attention will be given to parks, high-use pedestrian routes, and areas adjacent to public facilities.

Capel Road Stream

The green area along Platteklip Stream at Capel Road will also be kept clean. The City's Waste Services Department only cleans litter from the edge of the pavement and roads, and does not go down into the waterway itself. The area is used for washing and drying clothes, sleeping and as a toilet.

(ii) Environmental Development

13.1 Proposed services and/or projects

Objectives

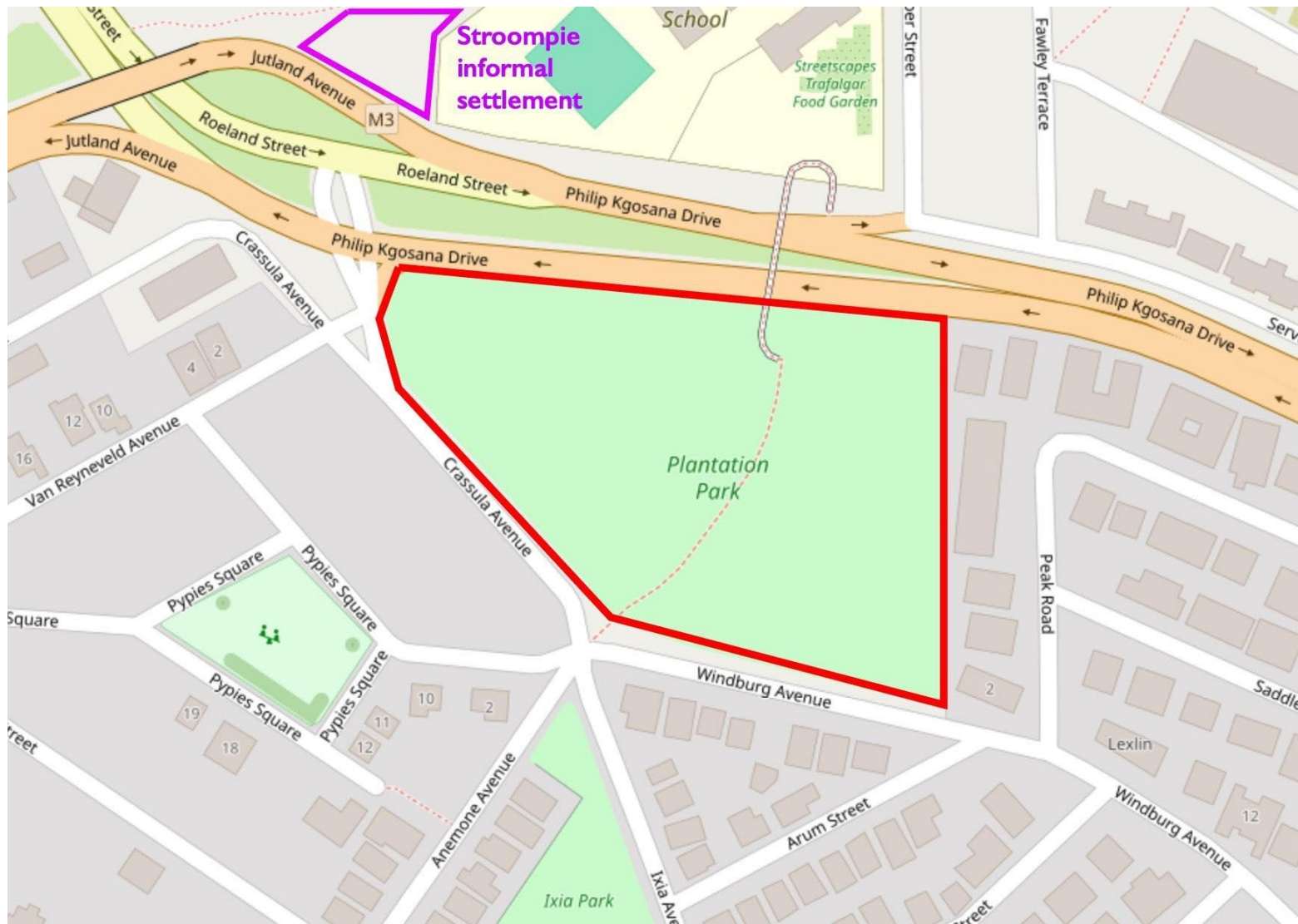
- Support safe, legal use of public spaces through improved public security, safety and well-maintained facilities
- Control flow of pedestrian traffic in and out of the area to help reduce crime
- Provide for an annual budget for additional capital expenditure to invest in improving public spaces and facilities

Services and projects

Fencing Plantation Park

Put a 2.4m high fence around Plantation Park, in collaboration with Friends of Plantation Park. This will improve physical safety in the park as children and animals will not be able to run into the M3 (which is a high traffic road). This will help control foot traffic through the park, particularly to/from Stroompie, and will help to reduce rough sleeping in the park and make it a community-friendly, re-usable event space.

The fencing cost is planned to be shared between the CID and private funders (such as the Speed Classic who have an agreement with the City to hold an annual event for the next few years that makes extensive use of Plantation Park).





Fencing of Jutland Ave

Put a fence along the edge of Jutland Ave (M3), which is a busy road and a key corridor to the City center. There are three green spaces which are directly adjacent to Jutland Ave, which makes them unsafe for use, particularly by children and animals.

This area is a key entry/exit point into Vredehoek. It experiences significant foot traffic from homeless people and criminal elements, particularly after dark, as they come from Lower Gardens and the City Center up into Vredehoek. The tree alongside the AFS/AGM Church is used as a toilet and often has fires lit underneath it. The green area close to the Upper Mill and Mill St junction is also used as a toilet and, due to the coverage provided by the trees and bushes, also attracts drug users.

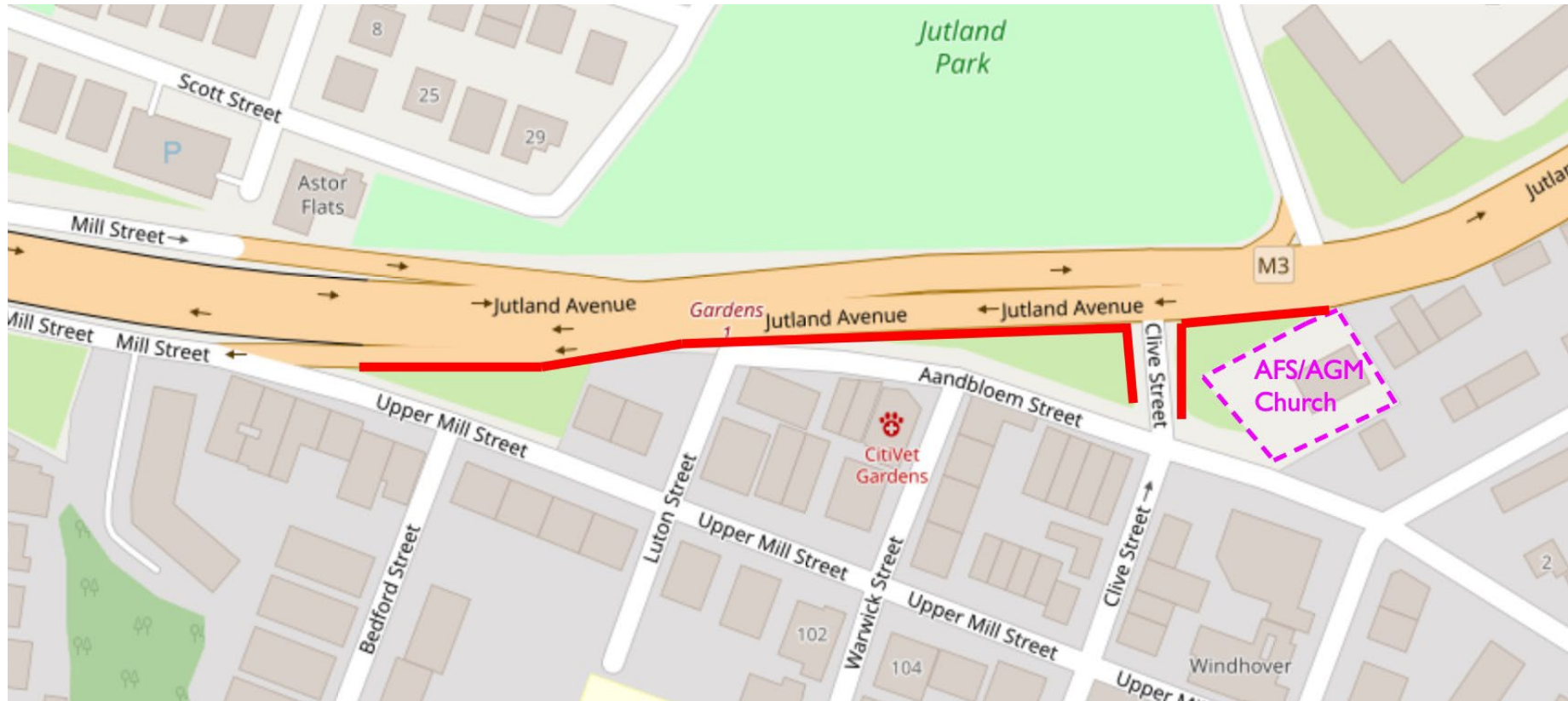
The proposed fence will run from where Mill Street and Upper Mill Street branch, east along Jutland Ave and Clive St to Aandbloem St. On the east side of Clive St, the fence will run from the end of the AFS/AGM Church's fence west along Jutland and up to Clive St and Aandbloem St.

The fence will make the green spaces safer and more usable by residents, including for children and dogs. There is a vet at the corner of Aandbloem and Warwick streets, and so there are animals in this area at risk of running into Jutland Ave traffic. There is an AFS/AGM Church just east of Clive Street and families and children will be able to more safely use the green areas.

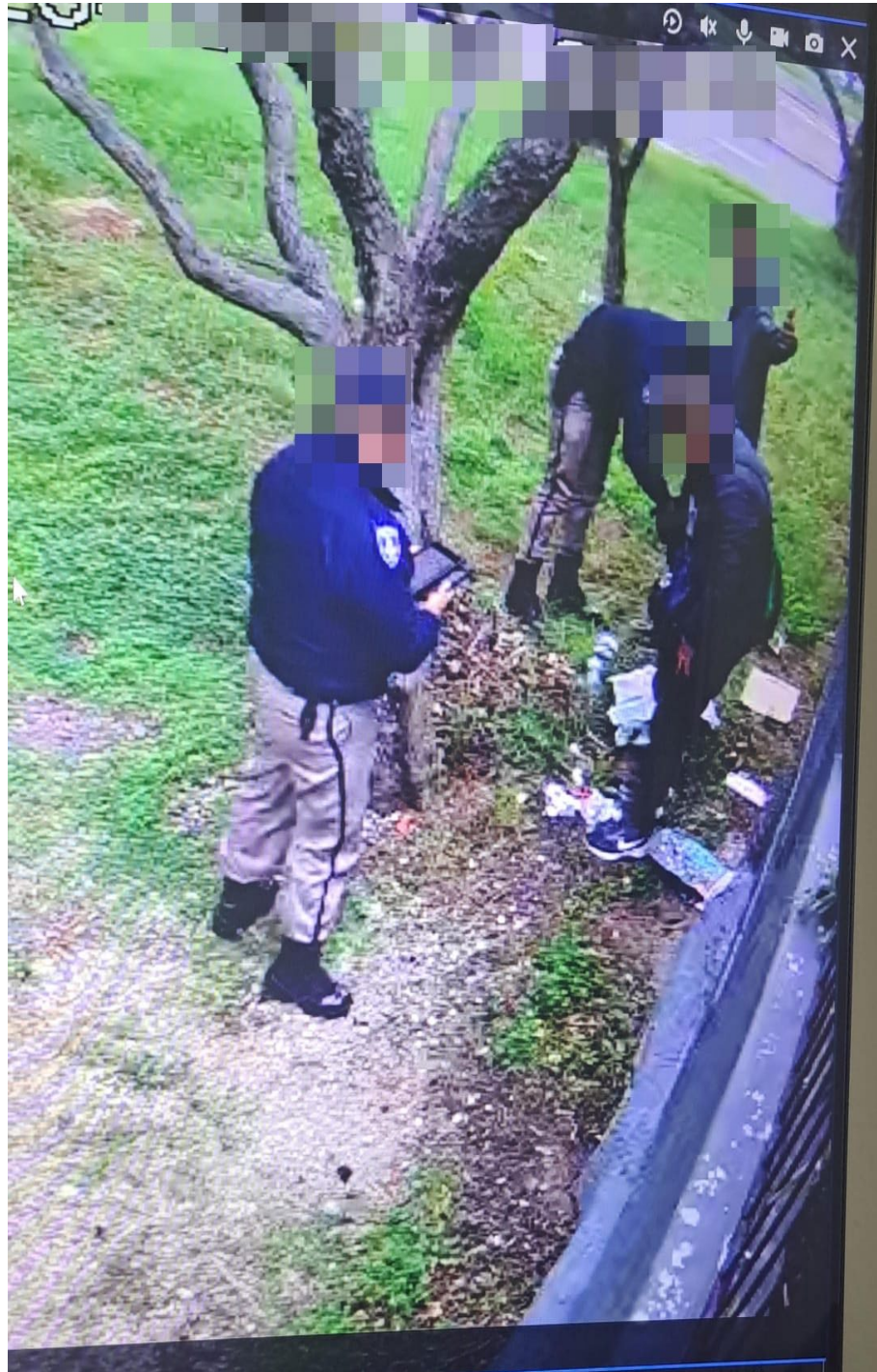
Fencing this area will also help to control foot traffic into and out of Vredehoek by forcing pedestrians to enter at Upper Mill St or Clive St, both of which will be well-lit at night and monitored by cameras.

The Steering Committee considered a green barrier along Jutland Avenue as an alternative to fencing. A mature *Carissa macrocarpa* hedge could provide a softer streetscape and a natural deterrent, but the greening advice received was that it would take approximately 18-36 months to become an effective barrier and would require ongoing pruning and maintenance, and could hinder camera monitoring if not properly maintained. A fence better meets the short term immediate safety requirement, maintains visibility for monitoring, and is expected

to be less costly to maintain over time than a hedge relied on as the primary barrier. Greening may still be added over time for beautification and environmental value, provided it does not compromise visibility, safety or maintenance requirements.

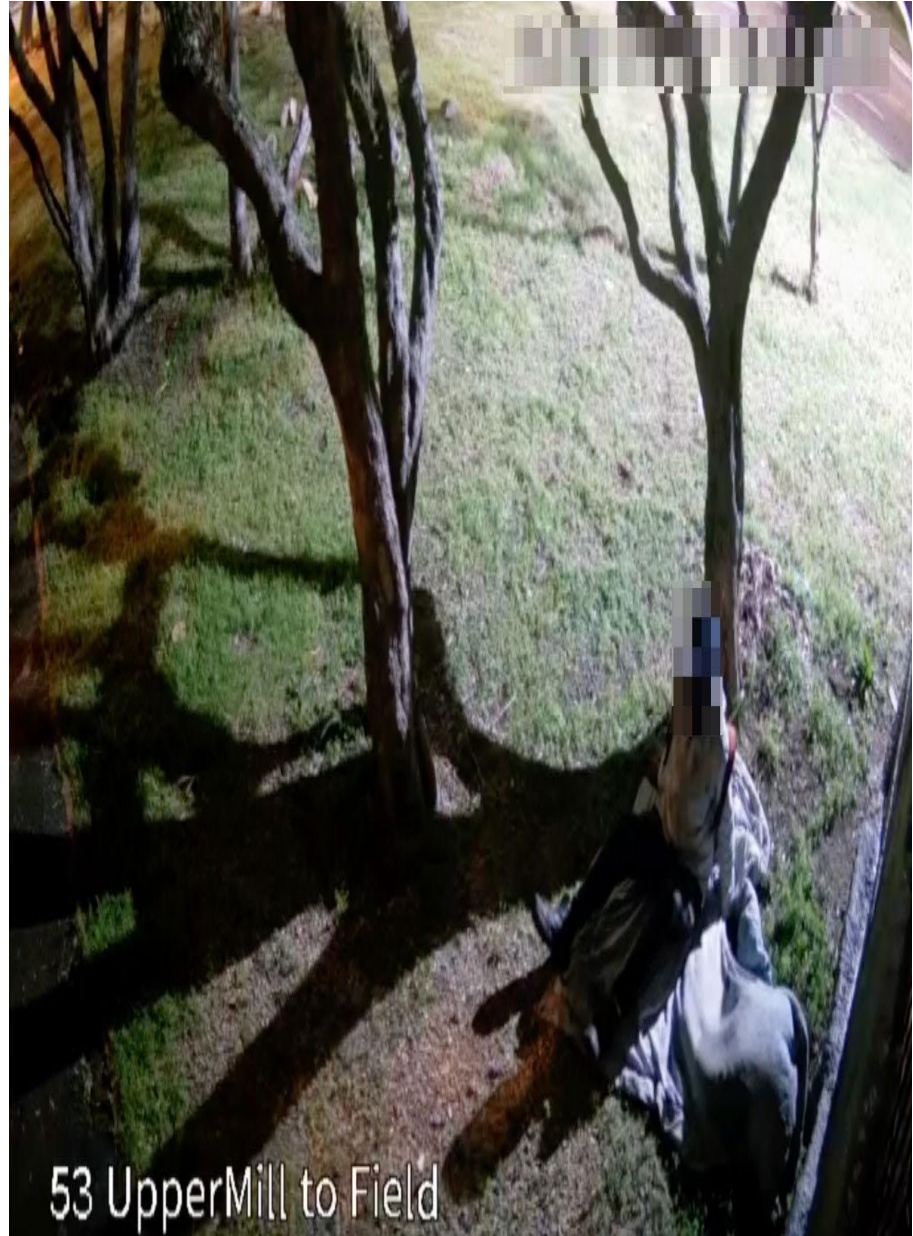






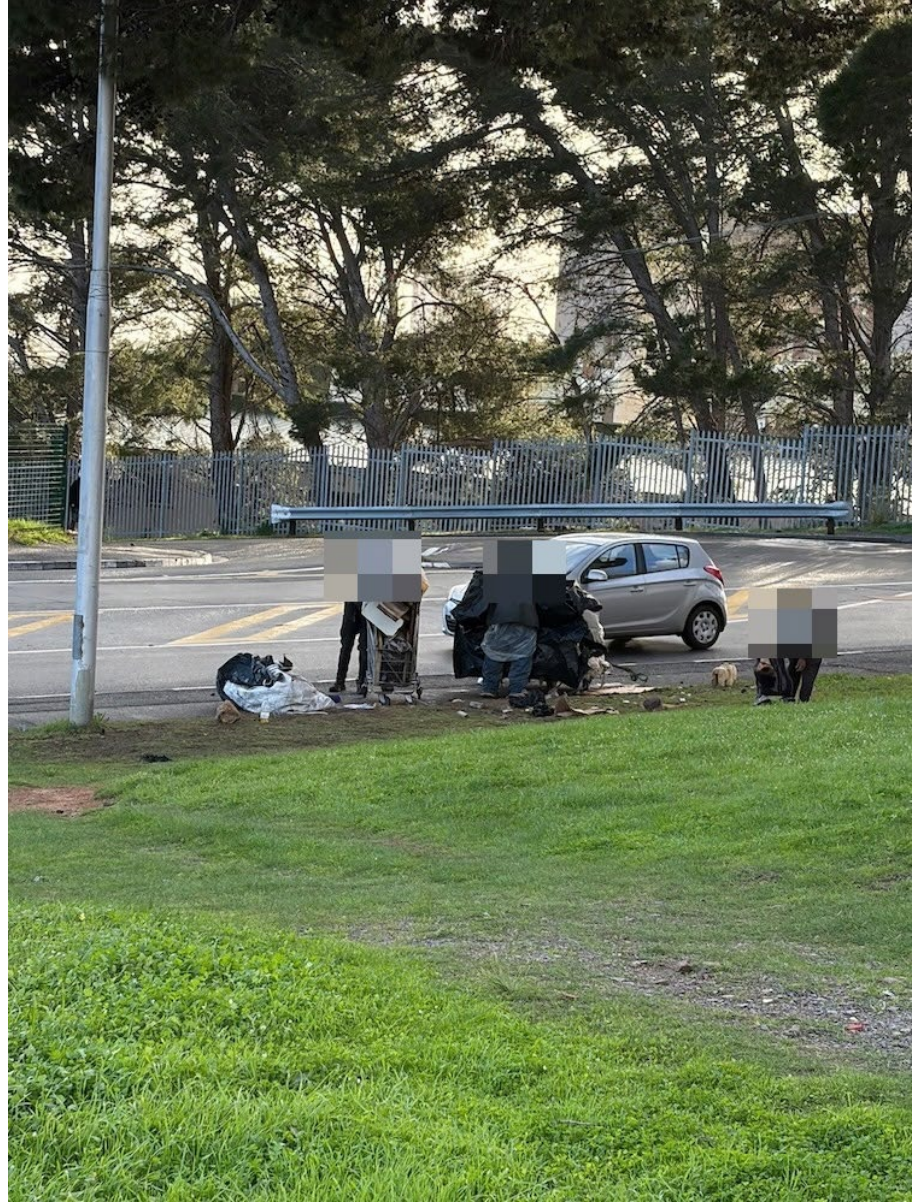

Fencing and gated access at end of Pinoak Road

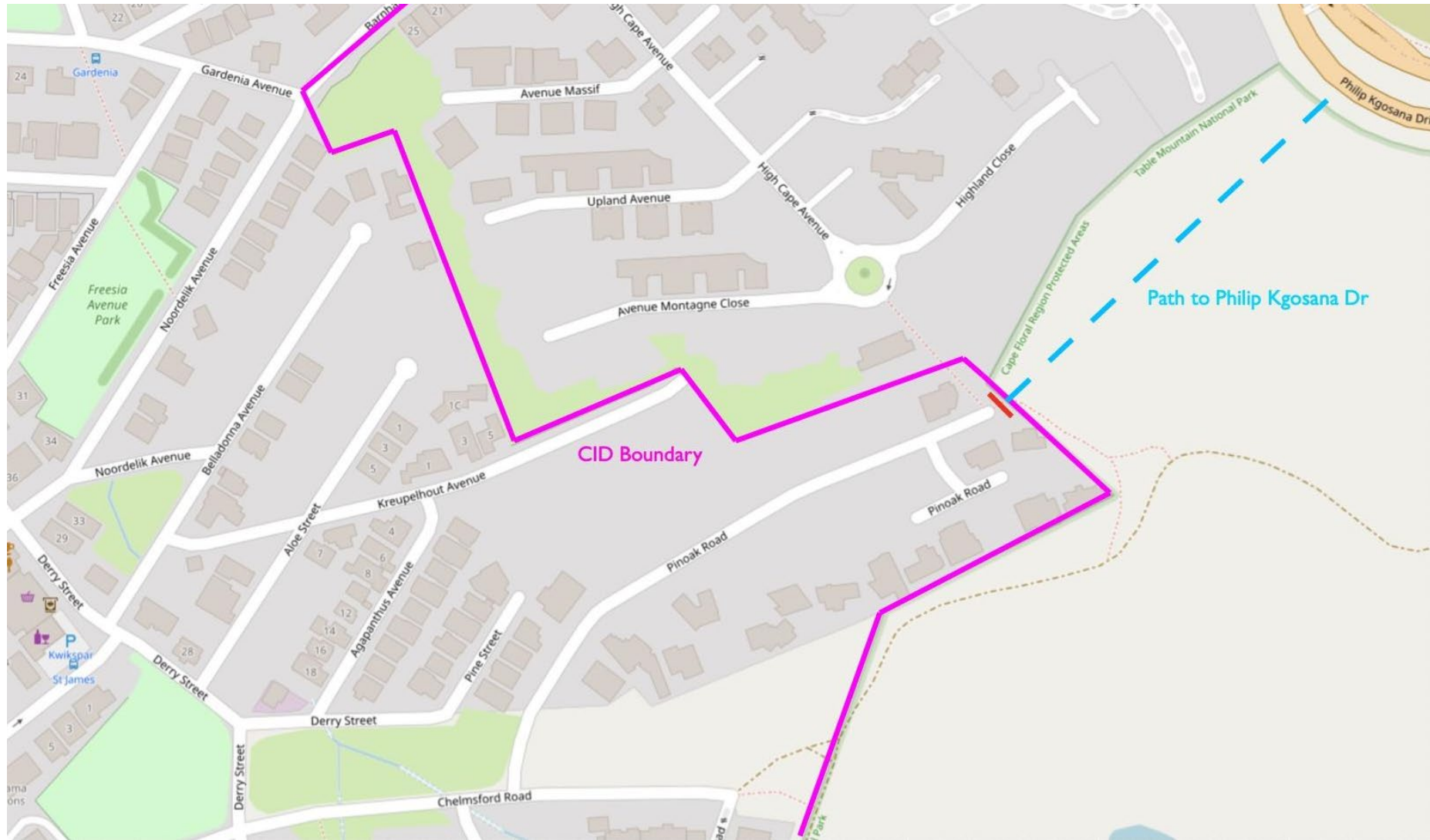
Pinoak Road ends on an open path onto Table Mountain National Park. It has formal walking routes east onto the mountain towards the quarry and south towards the paths along the southern border of Vredehoek and TMNP.

It also has informal paths down to Philip Kgosana drive, which are used by criminal elements to quickly escape Vredehoek either down to Philip Kgosana or to hide under rocks and in holes on the mountain.

The proposed fence and lockable gate (along with camera monitoring) at the end of Pinoak Rd where it leads onto TMNP would help to control access to the CID. High Cape (just north of the area) is not included in the CID and is fully fenced around its entire area.

Controlling this entry/exit point (especially after dark) would ensure that access to the area off of TMNP is through the formal (monitored) area at the end of Chelmsford Road, and reduce the value of Pinoak as an escape route onto the mountain and down onto Philip Kgosana.

The fence would have a lockable gate, the control of which would be managed by the CID and residents of Pinoak Road. This fence and gate would permit vehicle access when necessary, as this is a key area for firefighting services to prevent fires on Table Mountain from spreading into the suburb.

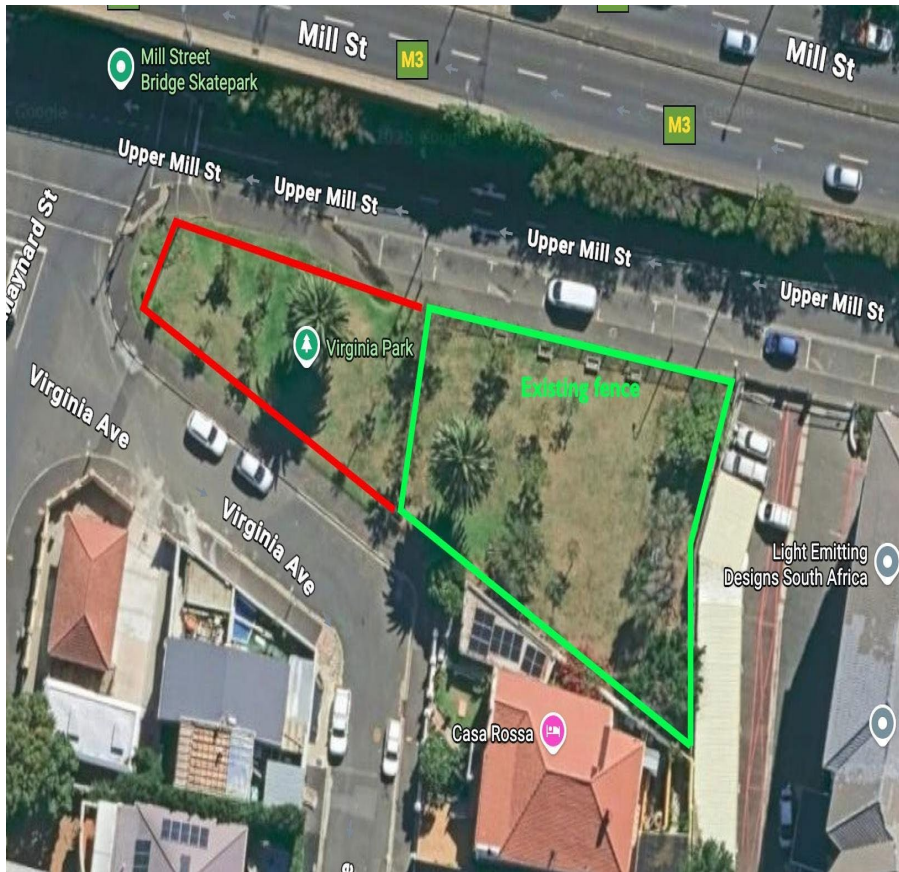






Extending the fence of Virginia Park

Extend the fence of Virginia Park to enclose the entire park area. This will make the enclosed park area larger and help to manage illegal and unsafe use of the green space.





Fencing projects (shown in red on maps and photos) will be subject to appropriate site-specific design, approval and operating arrangements before implementation. This includes consideration of lawful public access, gates and opening arrangements where relevant, emergency and maintenance access, pedestrian routes and maintenance costs.

- Plantation Park
- Virginia Park
- Jutland Ave
- Pinoak Road

13.4 Allocation of resources

Vredehoek has a number of parks and green spaces, the bulk of which are fenced. This helps to ensure that the spaces are safe for children and animals, and that access can be controlled, especially after hours.

Plantation Park is not fenced and is open to the M3 which is a major road into the city and is very busy. Fencing it will make it a safer space for use in general, allow for controlled access after hours, help control the flow of people to/from Stroompie into Vredehoek (especially after hours), and make the space more usable for events.

Similarly, the stretch of Jutland Ave (Philip Kgosana becomes Jutland Ave) at the edge of Vredehoek alongside Aandbloem Street is a porous barrier, and criminals are known to escape from Vredehook over Jutland Ave and into Lower Gardens. The streetside is also not safe for children or animals - there is a grassy area, a church, a vet and a dog grooming parlour on this stretch of Aandbloem street.

Only a portion of Virginia Park is fenced. Extending the fence to cover the entire park will make the fenced area larger.

(iii) Promotion of Social and Economic Development

14.1 Proposed services and/or projects

Objectives

- Reduce the negative impact of people sleeping rough in public spaces
- Prevent the formation of illegal structures and manage high risk hotspots through early intervention
- Promote more inclusive and orderly public spaces by reducing disorder linked to rough sleeping through proactive engagement and support
- Enable sustainable pathways towards stability and reintegration for willing individuals living on the street
- Provide employment opportunities linked to the CID's cleaning programme

Projects/services

The CID will contract an accredited third-party service provider to deliver a street-level social engagement and support programme, integrated with the CID's cleaning and urban-management activities.

The programme focuses on proactive, daily engagement with individuals sleeping rough in public spaces, with an emphasis on relationship-based support. The service provider will supply:

- Trained peer-support and outreach staff with lived experience of homelessness, present on the street daily.
- Part-time (one-third time) services of a registered social worker to provide professional oversight, case management, and referral support.

Peer-support staff are responsible for:

- Daily engagement with individuals sleeping rough in the CID.
- Monitoring and managing emerging hotspots.
- Encouraging access to shelters, health services, substance-use support, and other appropriate services provided by local authorities.
- Supporting individuals participating in the cleaning programme through mentoring and accountability.

The registered social worker provides:

- Case management support for individuals who engage with the programme.
- Supervision and guidance to peer-support staff.
- Coordination with external NGOs, City departments, and relevant government services.

Employment-linked upliftment

Employment opportunities are created through integration with the CID cleaning programme. Selected individuals are offered structured, paid work as part of the cleaning team, subject to readiness and ongoing support.

Work is used as a stabilising intervention, providing routine, responsibility, and income. Individuals employed in the programme are supported alongside their work through peer mentoring and social-work oversight, with the aim of improving reliability, life skills, and readiness for longer-term opportunities.

Not all individuals engaged by the programme will immediately enter employment. Outreach staff will also work with individuals who are not ready or willing to participate in work, focusing on reducing harmful behaviours in public spaces, preventing the establishment of illegal structures, and promoting uptake of appropriate support services.

The cleaning and social engagement model is intended to work with people already present in, or connected to, the local area. It is not intended to attract people into Vredehoek for work opportunities. Participation in cleaning work will be managed by the appointed service provider and will depend on suitability, readiness, supervision capacity, conduct, and ongoing support.

Outcomes for public spaces and the community

The integrated approach to cleaning and social development supports:

- Cleaner public spaces.
- Reduced disorder linked to rough sleeping.
- Early identification and management of high-risk situations.
- Practical pathways for individuals willing to engage and improve their circumstances.

The programme is support-focused, non-punitive, and supplementary to municipal services, providing the CID with a practical and accountable mechanism to manage social challenges that directly affect public spaces.

15. Financial Impact of the CID

The Vredehoek CID is funded through additional property rates levied on all rateable properties within the defined CID area. This funding mechanism aligns with the City Improvement Districts By-law and Policy which ensures that all funds collected are specifically used for improvements within the geographical boundary of the Vredehoek CID. The CID By-law allows for differentiated additional rates between categories of rateable property and as such a residential and non-residential additional rate is applicable in the CID.

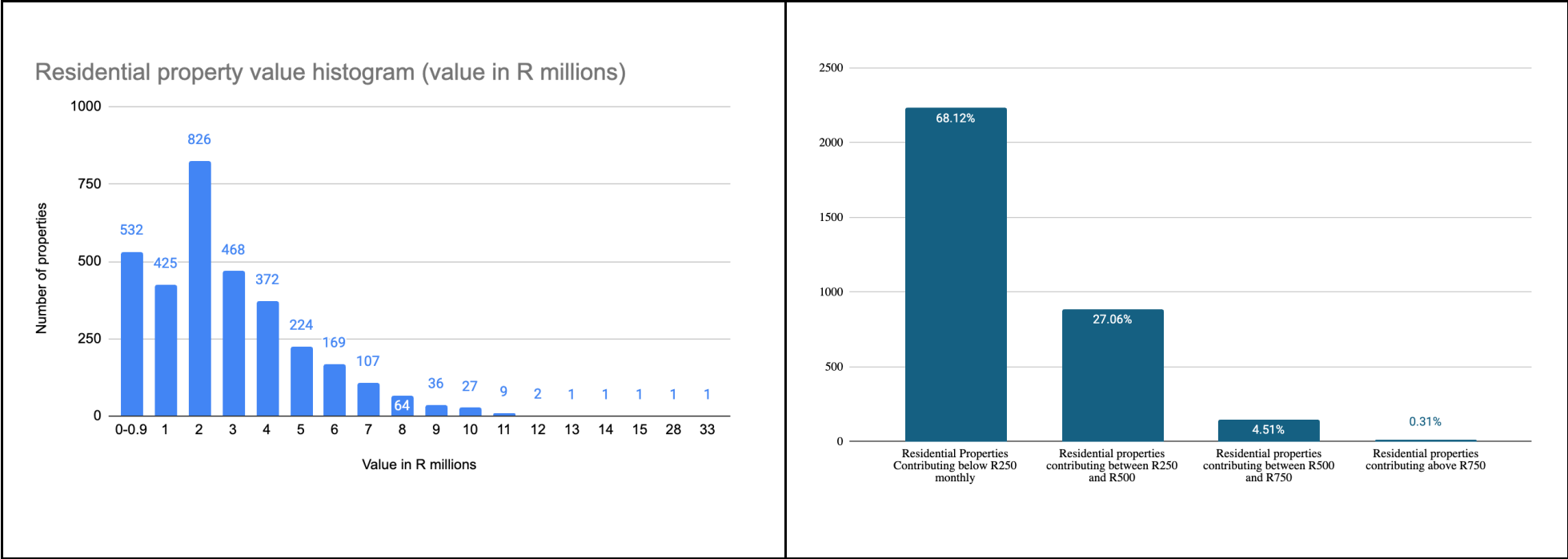
The CID By-law does not allow for a flat charge per household, flat charge per erf, or ad hoc exemption created by the CID.

The Steering Committee recognises that a valuation-based contribution can be difficult for some owners, including pensioners, owners living from savings, and owners of trust-owned properties where the occupier pays the municipal account. These concerns have been considered in assessing affordability, but the CID cannot create its own separate pensioner or other exemption categories outside the City's Rates Policy

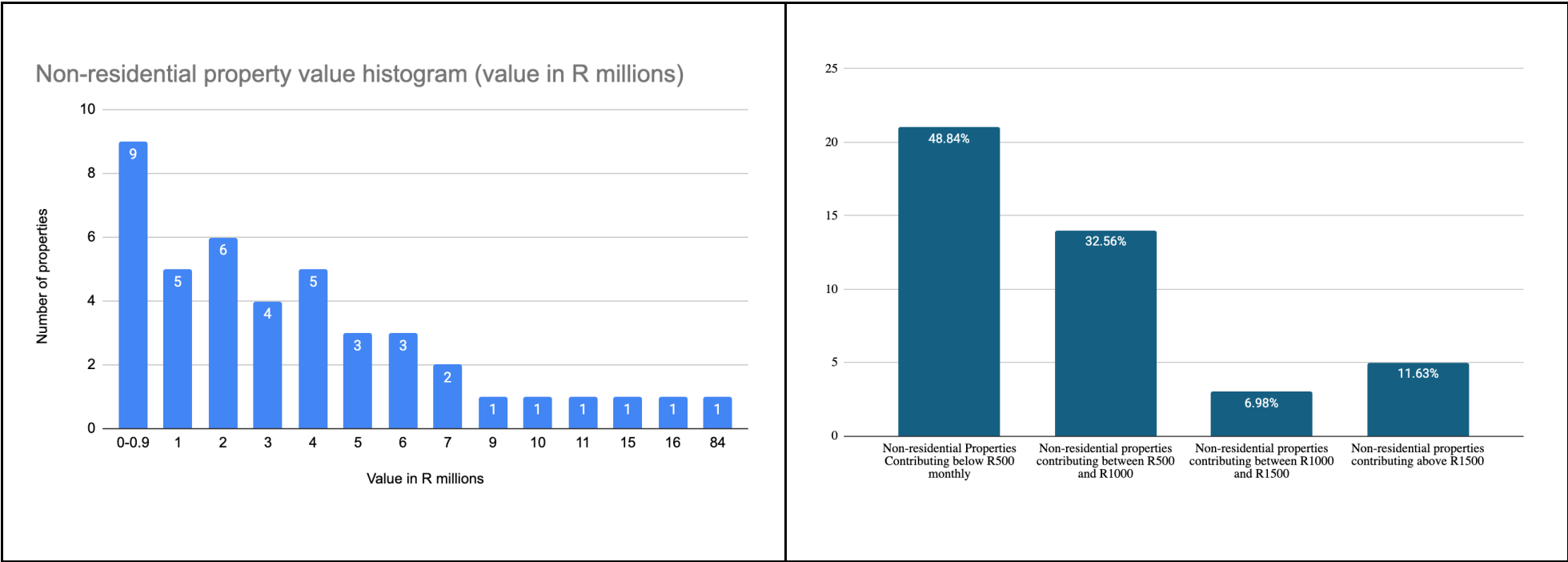
In designing the service mix, the Steering Committee has aimed to keep the business plan affordable, while still being efficient, effective and appropriately scaled.

Approximate property valuations and financial contributions

16. How much will it cost?

In line with the City's CID By-law, the Management Body is required to prepare a proposed annual budget for each successive financial year by the date and in the format required by the Executive Director based on the specific needs of the area as set out in the Business Plan. The budget is funded by an additional property rate levied on the municipal valuation of all properties within the CID boundary. The property rate is calculated by the City annually during the City's budget process. The additional rate is expressed as a Rate-in-the-land and is calculated by dividing the budget total with the total municipal valuation of properties in the CID. The budget and additional rates are approved by Council with the City's budget and is applicable over a financial year, which starts on 1 July.

The additional rate is payable by each property or sectional title unit that has its own municipal valuation and rates account. For sectional titles, the body corporate is not responsible for paying the additional rate, unless the property has a single ratepayer and municipal rates account.

Individual contributions for residential and non-residential properties can be calculated as follows:

Residential:

- $\text{Municipal valuation} \times \text{R } 0.000666 = \text{Annual contribution (VAT excl.)}$
- $\text{Annual contribution (VAT excl.)} \div 12 = \text{Average monthly contribution (VAT excl.)}$
- $\text{Average monthly contribution (VAT excl.)} \times 1.15 = \text{Average monthly contribution (VAT incl.)}$

Non - Residential:

- $\text{Municipal valuation} \times \text{R } 0.001523 = \text{Annual contribution (VAT excl.)}$
- $\text{Annual contribution (VAT excl.)} \div 12 = \text{Average monthly contribution (VAT excl.)}$
- $\text{Average monthly contribution (VAT excl.)} \times 1.15 = \text{Average monthly contribution (VAT incl.)}$

The larger increases in Years 2 and 3 reflect upfront capital investment during those years, including the additional cameras and fencing projects, alongside ordinary cost inflation. From Year 4 onward, this capital investment tapers off substantially, and the smaller increases reflect ordinary inflation-linked costs only.

The impact on individual property owners in the outer years of the CID term may vary due to valuation fluctuations caused by successful valuation objections, subdivisions, new developments, court amendments, implementation of a new General Valuation Roll or Supplementary Valuation roll causing the CID budget to be spread over an increased or reduced total municipal valuation base.

Because the CID's budget is a fixed amount each year, it does not increase simply because valuations rise. The rate-in-the-rand is instead recalculated so the same fixed budget is divided across the updated total valuation base. A general rise or fall in valuations across the CID does not, by itself, mean the CID is collecting more or less from ratepayers overall. Where new developments add properties to the CID's

rateable base without increasing the approved budget, the same fixed budget is spread across a larger valuation base which would likely reduce the contribution required from existing ratepayers.

Members vote annually at the AGM to adopt each year's budget, within the fixed five-year total already approved in this application. The CID cannot materially increase the annual budget, or meaningfully shift its focus between services, without following a separate, formal process required by the CID By-law and Policy. Where there is a material change in the budget, additional services or boundary, reference can be made to section 26 of the CID By-law. The Council may not levy an additional rate exceeding 25% of the applicable municipal rate on any rateable property within a newly established CID in the first year.

Property owners who receive a full or partial rates rebate from the City will receive a full rebate on the CID additional rate. Owners who believe they may qualify for a City rates rebate should apply through the City's normal rates-rebate process. The CID cannot grant a separate exemption where the City has not granted a rebate under the Rates Policy.

17. Proposed Management Structure

Once the Vredehoek CID receives approval from the City, a non-profit company (NPC) will be incorporated in accordance with the Companies Act. The board will meet quarterly. The NPC will open a bank account and implement the business plan.

During implementation (see Part B - Implementation Plan), the CID Board must approve and annually review management plans for public safety, maintenance and cleansing, environmental development, social and economic development, and communication. These plans must include clear deliverables and measurable service standards appropriate to the appointed service providers, approved budget and operating conditions. Annual reporting should include practical delivery indicators, such as incident records, service requests logged and followed up, cleaning coverage, complaints received and resolved, camera/patrol availability where applicable, and social programme outputs where reasonably measurable.

In addition to statutory AGMs, annual reports and published financial and performance information, the CID will invite ongoing comments and complaints through its website and communication channels. The frequency and form of this reporting e.g. monthly newsletters or dashboards tracking measurable KPIs for each pillar of service can be adjusted over time based on what members request, within the operational capacity of the CID team. Community feedback, incident data, service-provider performance and budget constraints will be considered when annual management plans and priorities are reviewed.

18. Membership and Management Body

18.1 Membership of the NPC

Membership is open to ratepayers within the CID area who are paying the additional rate. There are no costs for membership, and eligible ratepayers must apply in writing to the NPC Directors to be a member (membership forms will be made available via the CID website).

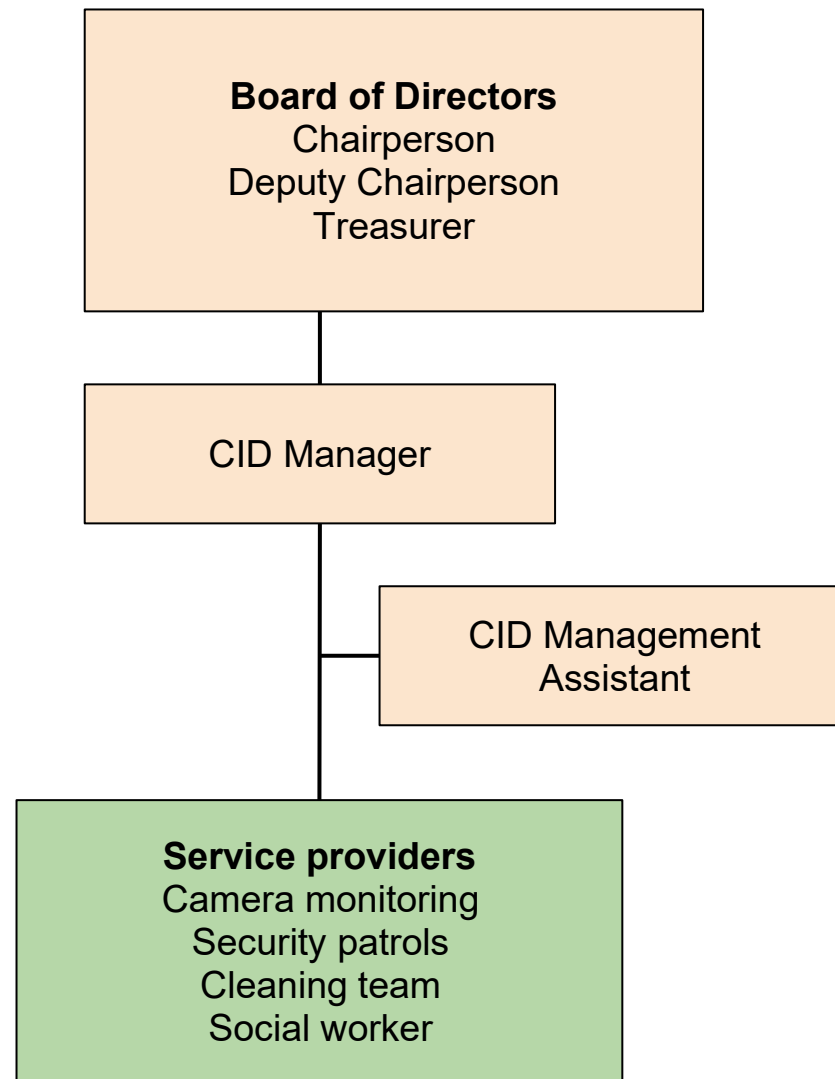
The CID will ensure inclusivity by providing feedback to the public at annual general meetings, and sharing the notices, meeting agendas and minutes of Board and members' meetings on the CID website. The entire community is allowed to participate at members' meetings but only members of the NPC are eligible to vote at members' meetings.

18.2 Composition and election of Directors

Under the CID Policy and the CID By-law, the CID is initially established with an interim Board. This Board is, or is appointed, by the Steering Committee at the time the NPC is registered. The interim Board exists to ensure continuity, compliance, and operational readiness until the first Annual General Meeting (AGM). The first AGM must take place within six months of the establishment of the NPC. At this first AGM, the members shall elect a new Board of Directors from within the members of the NPC, in accordance with the CID Policy and By-law.

The Board is not remunerated for its duties. The Board shall comprise a minimum of 3 Directors. One third of the serving Directors must step down annually, but could be re-elected at the AGM. The Board shall elect a Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson and Treasurer from its members at the first meeting of the Board of directors convened after each AGM.

The Board of Directors are collectively responsible for the performance of the Vredehoek CID, and for meeting the financial and performance reporting requirements vis-à-vis the City.



18.3 Procurement of Service Providers

Under the City's CID Policy (clause 32.1), it is required to observe the procurement principles enshrined in Section 217 of the Constitution. Procurement must be fair, equitable, transparent, competitive and cost-effective. The Policy (clause 32.2) requires the Board to adopt its own procurement rules to give effect to this, and sets out specific safeguards those rules must include at a minimum. The CID's procurement rules are built directly around these requirements:

- **Fair, equitable, transparent, competitive and cost-effective procurement** (Policy clause 32.3.1): service providers are appointed through a documented process: written quotations for smaller purchases, and a publicly advertised Request for Quotation (RFQ) or tender for larger or ongoing service contracts evaluated against criteria agreed by the Board in advance.
- **Excluding corrupt persons from contracts** (clause 32.3.2): any bidder with a relevant criminal or fraud conviction is disqualified from being awarded a contract.
- **Excluding persons unfit to serve as a company director** (clause 32.3.3): any bidder, or principal of a bidding company, disqualified from serving as a director under the Companies Act is excluded from being awarded a contract.
- **Oversight of decision-makers through multiple approvals** (clause 32.3.4): no contract may be awarded on a single Director's decision alone, significant procurement decisions and contract awards require approval by more than one Director, recorded in Board minutes.
- **Rotation of procurement decision-makers** (clause 32.3.5): responsibility for managing procurement processes will rotate between Directors, or between the Board and CID Manager, on a periodic basis, to reduce the risk of relationships forming that could lead to corruption.

These rules apply equally to the initial interim Board and the elected Board following the first AGM. The CID's annual report to the City will include an overview of its supply chain management processes, any challenges experienced, and any unsolicited bidding proposals received during the year, as required under the Policy's annual reporting provisions.

19. Permissible Amendments to the Business Plan without Further Consent

If a determination is made to affect a material alteration to the geographical boundaries of the CID, such alteration shall be implemented in accordance with the formal process in Section 26 of the CID By-law. If an amendment to the geographical boundaries of a CID is deemed non-material and does not alter the terms of liability or the quantum of the additional rate levied, such amendment shall be undertaken in compliance with Section 25 of the City Improvement District By-law, 2023.

Where a change of strategy or additional services are necessitated through collaboration with municipal departments, and such services are not expressly provided for in the motivation report but is deemed as enhanced and/or supplementary municipal services, the business plan may be amended without further consent, provided that the amendment is non-material and the process prescribed under Section 25 of the City Improvement District By-law, 2023 is duly followed.

There are currently no further plans to investigate or explore significant changes to the strategy or operations of the Vredehoek CID and therefore none are noted here.

20. Term Renewal and Dissolution

The application covers a fixed five-year term over the financial years between 2027 and 2032. At the end of that term, the CID must be actively renewed through a further formal process described by the CID By-law and Policy, giving ratepayers a built-in checkpoint to reconsider whether the CID should continue. Renewal requires a resolution at the CID's final AGM of the term, followed by a 30-day objection period open to every ratepayer; the City may only approve renewal if written objections are not received from at least 40% of ratepayers. If ratepayers are dissatisfied with the CID's performance, this renewal point provides a clear opportunity to end it without requiring any special action beforehand.

Under Section 28 of the CID By-law, the City may dissolve a CID at any time if a majority of ratepayers liable for the additional rate sign a written application requesting dissolution, or if members pass a special resolution at a members' meeting to voluntarily wind up the NPC in accordance with the Companies Act. The City itself may also dissolve a CID for good cause, following consultation with the Board and the local community.

On dissolution, any remaining funds are not lost or absorbed by the City. The CID's net assets, after settling any outstanding liabilities, are distributed in accordance with the Companies Act and the NPC's own founding documents. The City assists in identifying an appropriate beneficiary for these funds, giving preference to neighbouring CIDs with similar objectives e.g. redirecting any remaining balance toward continued public safety or cleansing work in the surrounding area, rather than the funds disappearing into general City revenue.

Vredehoek CID Urban Management Report

February 2026

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1. Overview

The Vredehoek CID Steering Committee conducted an Urban Management Survey (UMS) as part of the process of establishing the Vredehoek CID. The survey was conducted in terms of Section 8.1.2 of the City of Cape Town's CID Policy.

The objective of the UMS is to determine the concerns and needs of the Vredehoek community in order to construct an appropriate business plan for the CID.

The final number of considered responses is 785 which is 25.2% of the 3114 ratepayers in the Vredehoek CID area. This exceeds the 20% response rate required by Section 8.1.2.1.1 of the CID Policy. The survey was widely circulated by email and social media and the Steering Committee believes it reasonably represents the concerns and needs of the Vredehoek community.

2. Summary of results

The initial survey ran from 1 September 2025 to 31 October 2025 and 719 responses from this run were considered in the final results after cleaning and de-duplication. A survey for the additional area between Upper Buitenkant St and Schoonder, Prince and Flower Streets was run from 18 February 2026 to 25 February 2026 and 66 responses from this run were considered in the final results after cleaning and de-duplication. The total number of responses considered is 785.

2.1 Demographics

- 52% of respondents are between 35 and 54, and 91% of respondents are 35 or older.
- Respondents are split approximately equally between male and female
- 62% of respondents own a house, 36% own an apartment

2.2 Safety

Safety is a major concern for residents, particularly on the streets and in public spaces.

- Very few respondents feel completely safe, or not safe at all
- 37% of respondents feel completely or somewhat safe, 37% are neutral, and 26% feel somewhat unsafe or not safe at all
- DPVWatch, private security firms and camera monitoring are largely considered effective security measures
- SAPS is considered ineffective by 65% of respondents, and effective by only 10%

2.3 Concerns

The primary concerns of respondents relate to homelessness, safety and security, and the negative aspects of homelessness including crime, cleanliness, bin picking, begging and drug abuse.

Safety in public spaces is of particular concern and homelessness is considered a major contributor to this.

While house breaking and entering is one of the top 3 concerns, 85% of houses (43% of apartments) have armed response and only 19% of those without are considering getting it in the next year.

Theft from a vehicle is of much greater concern than **theft of** a vehicle. Off-street parking is not common in Vredehoek and again this speaks to safety on the streets.

- After safety, homelessness (and related factors), cleanliness of public spaces is somewhat of a concern
- Shoplifting, theft from businesses, graffiti and noise pollution are not considered significant concerns
- Issues that are concerns correlate with those issues respondents rated as requiring additional funding

3. Methodology

The survey was conducted in terms of Section 8.1.2 of the City's CID Policy. The survey's form and content was approved by the City on 21 August 2025. The survey was conducted online using Google Forms and was open for responses from 1 September 2025 to 31 October 2025 (initial boundary area) and from 18 February 2026 to 25 February 2026 (additional area between Upper Buitenkant St and Schoonder, Prince and Flower Streets).

The community was invited to participate in the survey using the following mechanisms:

- On the Vredehoek CID website at vredehoekcid.co.za
- By email through multiple emails to all ratepayer email addresses provided by the City
- By email through the Vredehoek CID Newsletter, to all ratepayer emails provided by the City and to individuals who subscribed to the newsletter
- By WhatsApp on the Upper and Lower Devil's Peak Vredehoek Chat groups
- On Facebook in the Vredehoek Facebook Group
- In person during the DPVWatch AGM on 22 October 2025

The Vredehoek CID's boundary was expanded on 15 October 2025. All additional ratepayers were notified of the survey by email, and all email campaigns after this date included the additional ratepayers. The boundary was expanded again in February 2026 to include properties in the area between Upper Buitenkant St and Schoonder, Prince and Flower Streets.

Of 881 responses, 20 (2%) were considered duplicates based on respondent details. Only the first response was used in these cases.

Of the remaining 861 responses, 785 (91%) were by self-identified property owners, while 68 (7%) identified as renters and 9 (1%) did not answer the question. The 785 owner responses are used throughout this analysis.

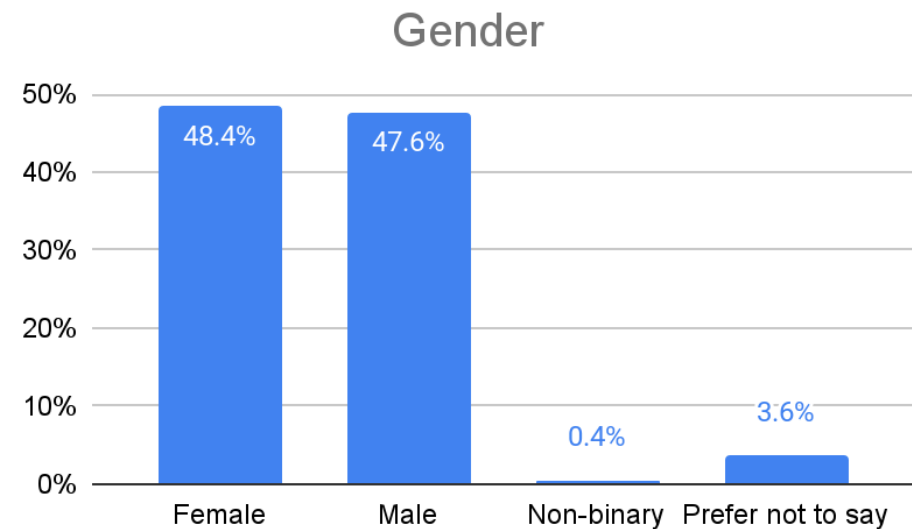
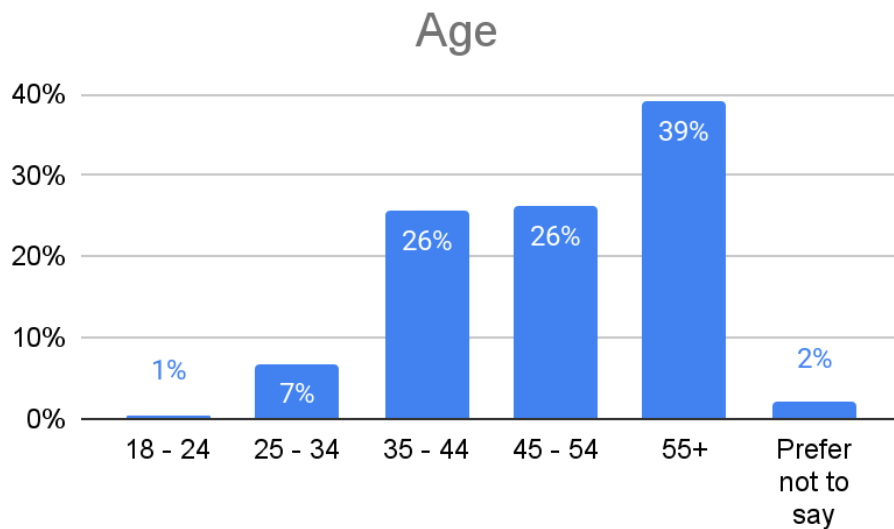

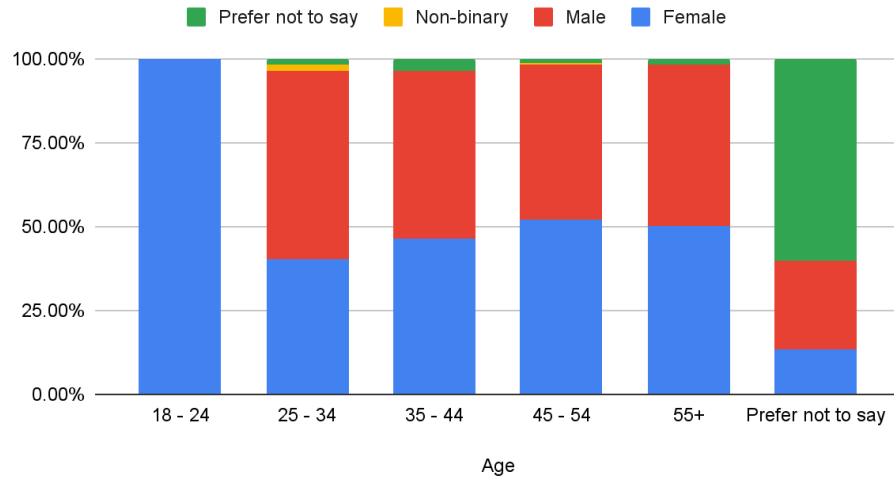

4.1 Demographics

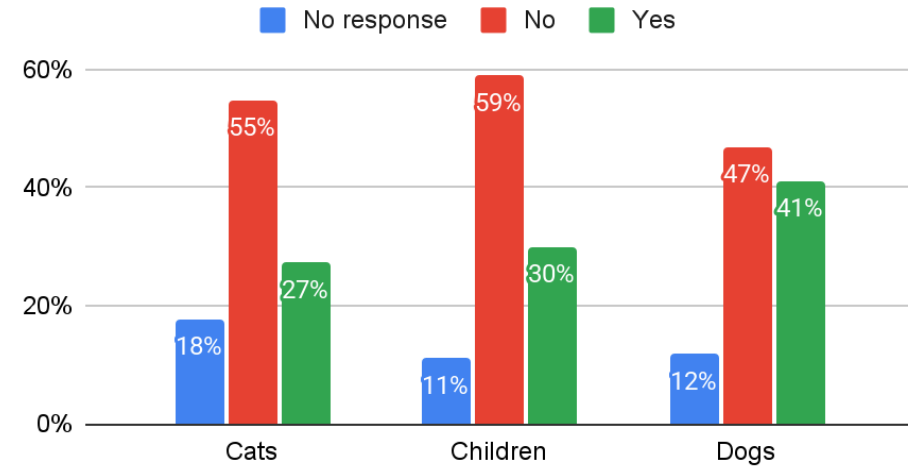
- 52% of respondents are between 35 and 54, and 91% of respondents are 35 or older.

Gender by age

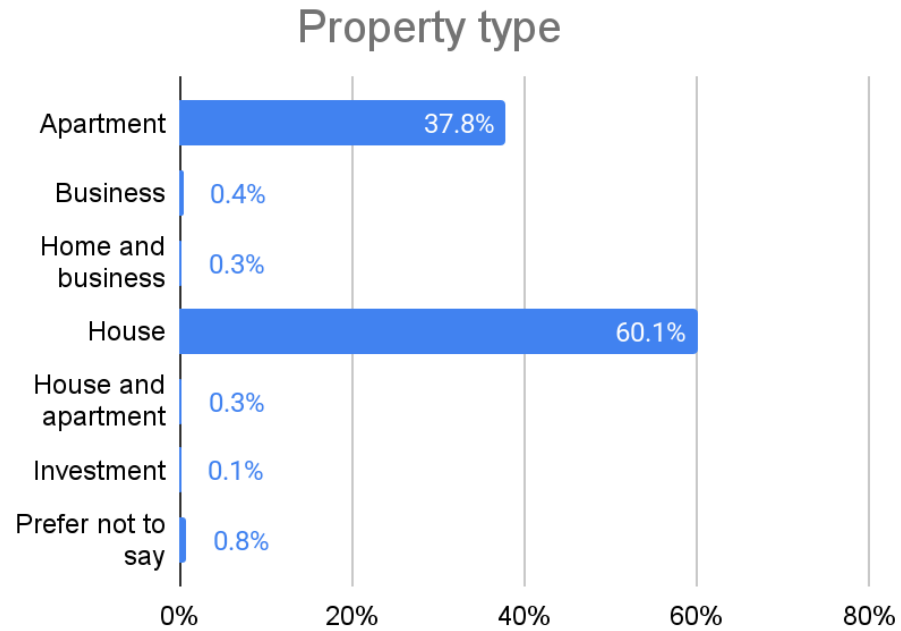

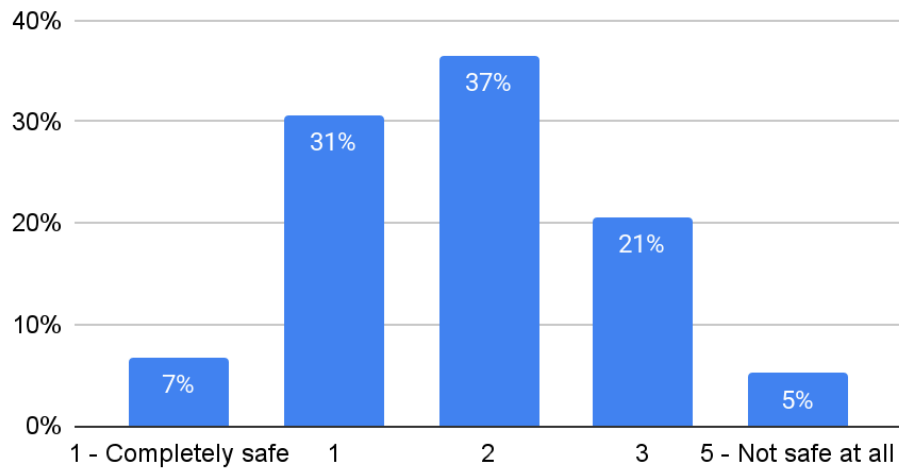
- 60% of respondents own a house
- 38% of respondents own an apartment



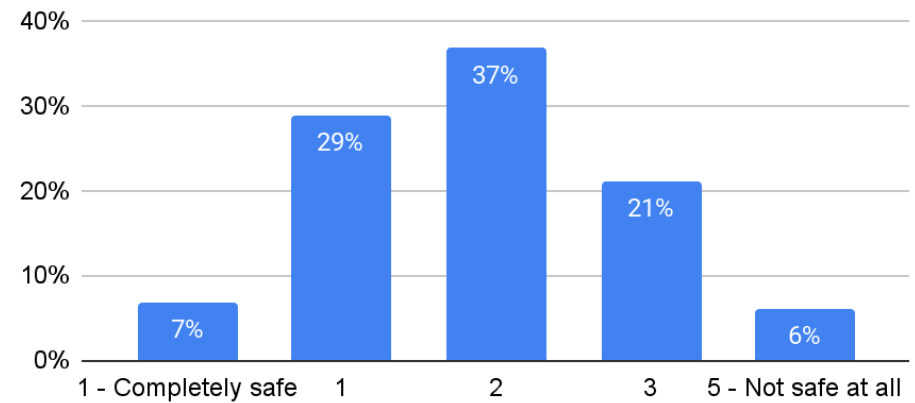
4.3 Perceptions of safety

How safe do you feel in our neighbourhood?



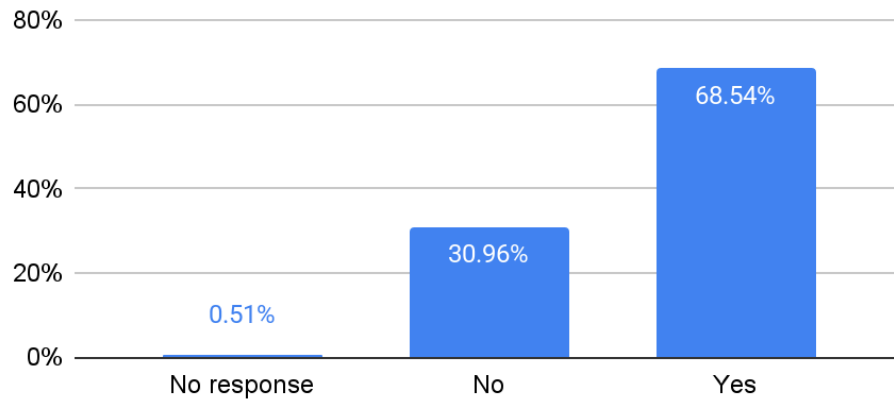
How safe do you think visitors feel in our neighbourhood?



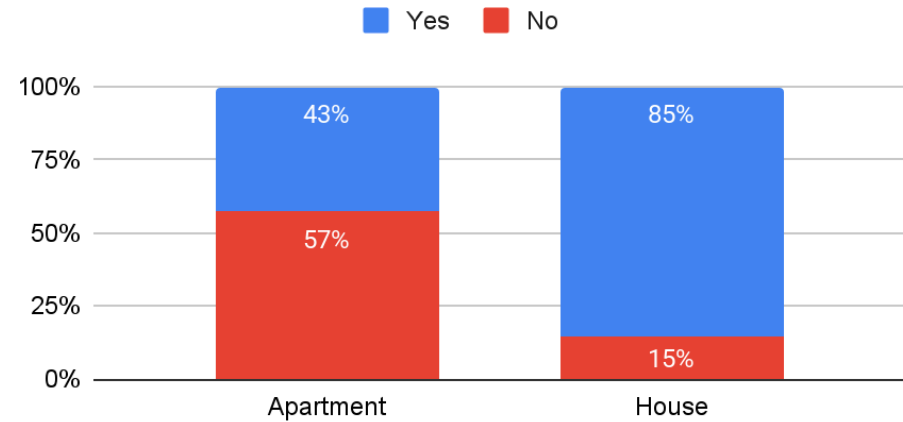
4.4 Private security

- About one fifth of respondents (18%) are planning on getting private security in the next year

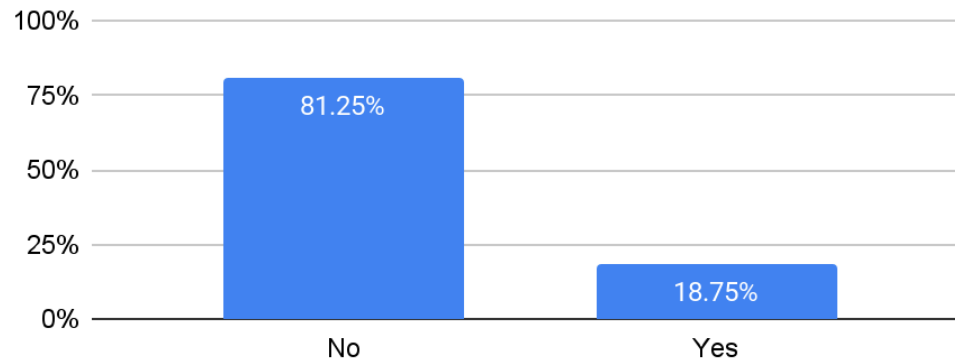
Do you have private security and/or armed response?



Do you have private security and/or armed response?

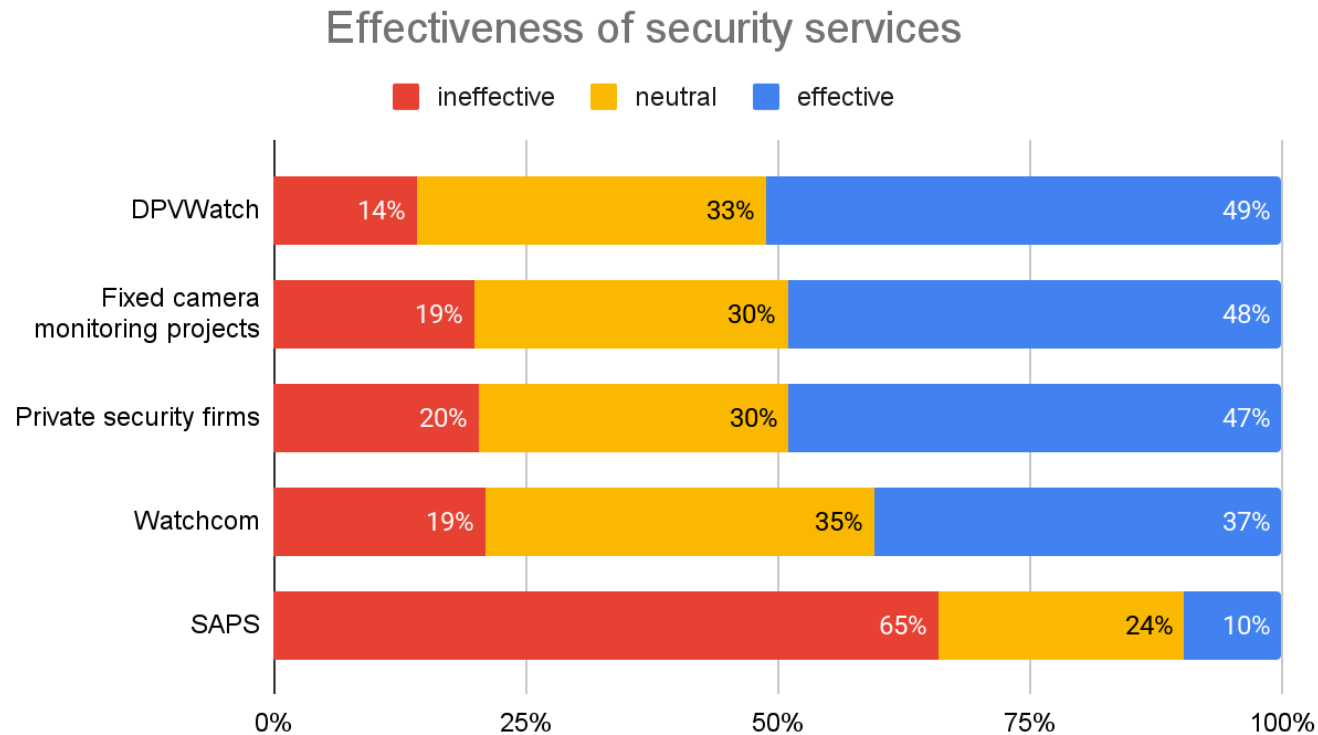


Are you planning to get private security/armed response in the next year?

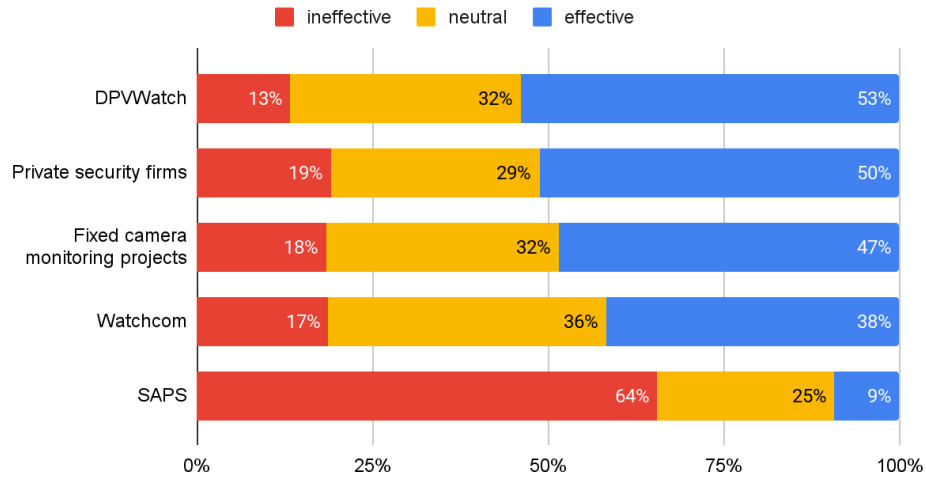


4.5 Effectiveness of security services

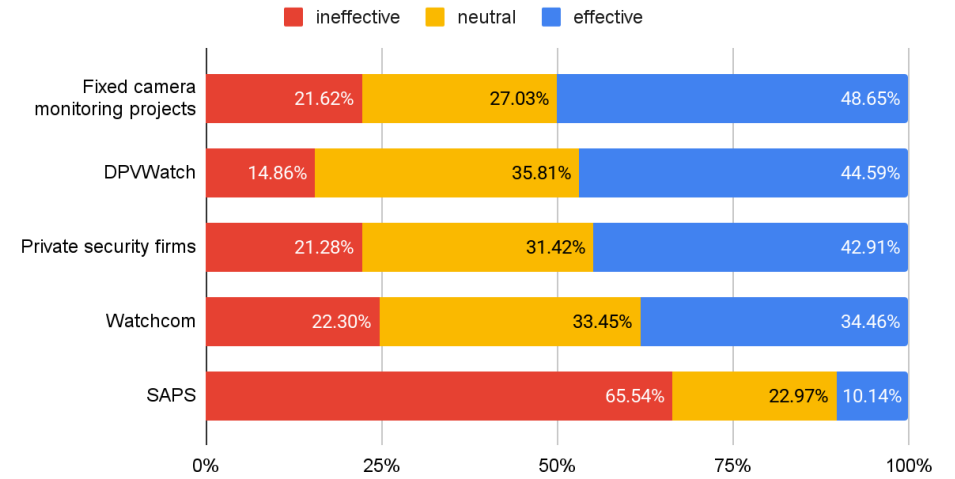
- DPVWatch is considered effective by just under half of respondents, and is considered the least ineffective
- Camera monitoring and private security firms are considered similarly effective with just under half considering them effective
- SAPS is considered ineffective by almost two thirds of respondents

Effectiveness of security services (Houses)



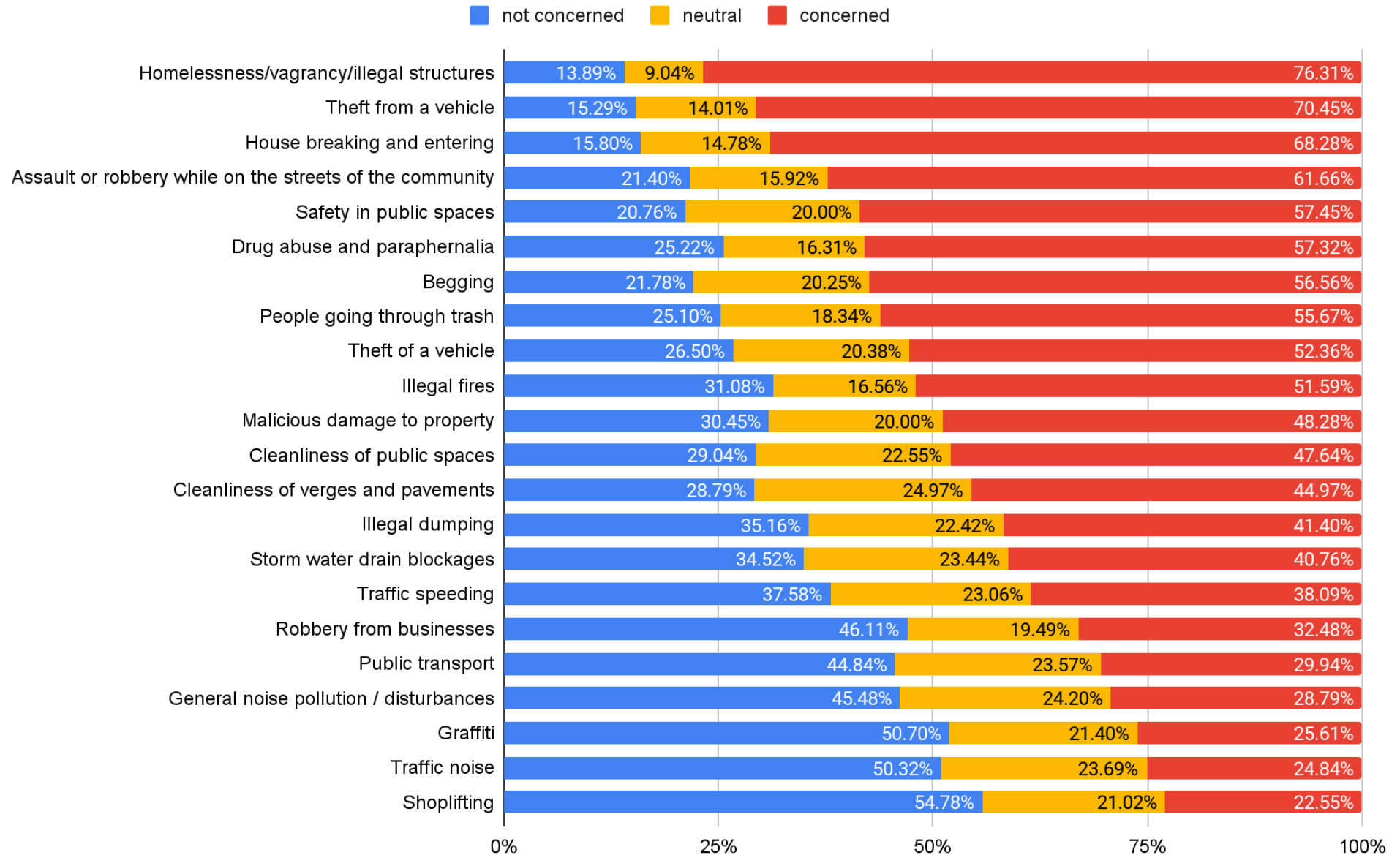
Effectiveness of security services (Apartments)



4.6 Concerns

- 10 of the 22 issues are rated as somewhat or very concerning by 50% or more of respondents
 - Homelessness/vagrancy/illegal structures
 - Theft from a vehicle
 - House breaking and entering
 - Assault or robbery while on the streets of the community
 - Safety in public spaces
 - Drug abuse and paraphernalia
 - Begging
 - People going through trash
 - Theft of a vehicle
 - Illegal fires
- Negative aspects of homelessness are key concerns, including:
 - drug abuse
 - begging
 - bin picking
 - Illegal fires
- Safety on streets and in public spaces are in the top 5 concerns
- Theft **from** a vehicle is of greater concern (70%) than theft **of** a vehicle (52%)
- Cleanliness (but not graffiti), illegal dumping and stormwater drain blockages are concerns for a little under 50% of the community
- 6 issues are rated not concerned by more than 45% of respondents
 - robbery from businesses
 - public transport
 - general noise pollution
 - graffiti
 - traffic noise
 - shoplifting

4.7 Funding of concerns

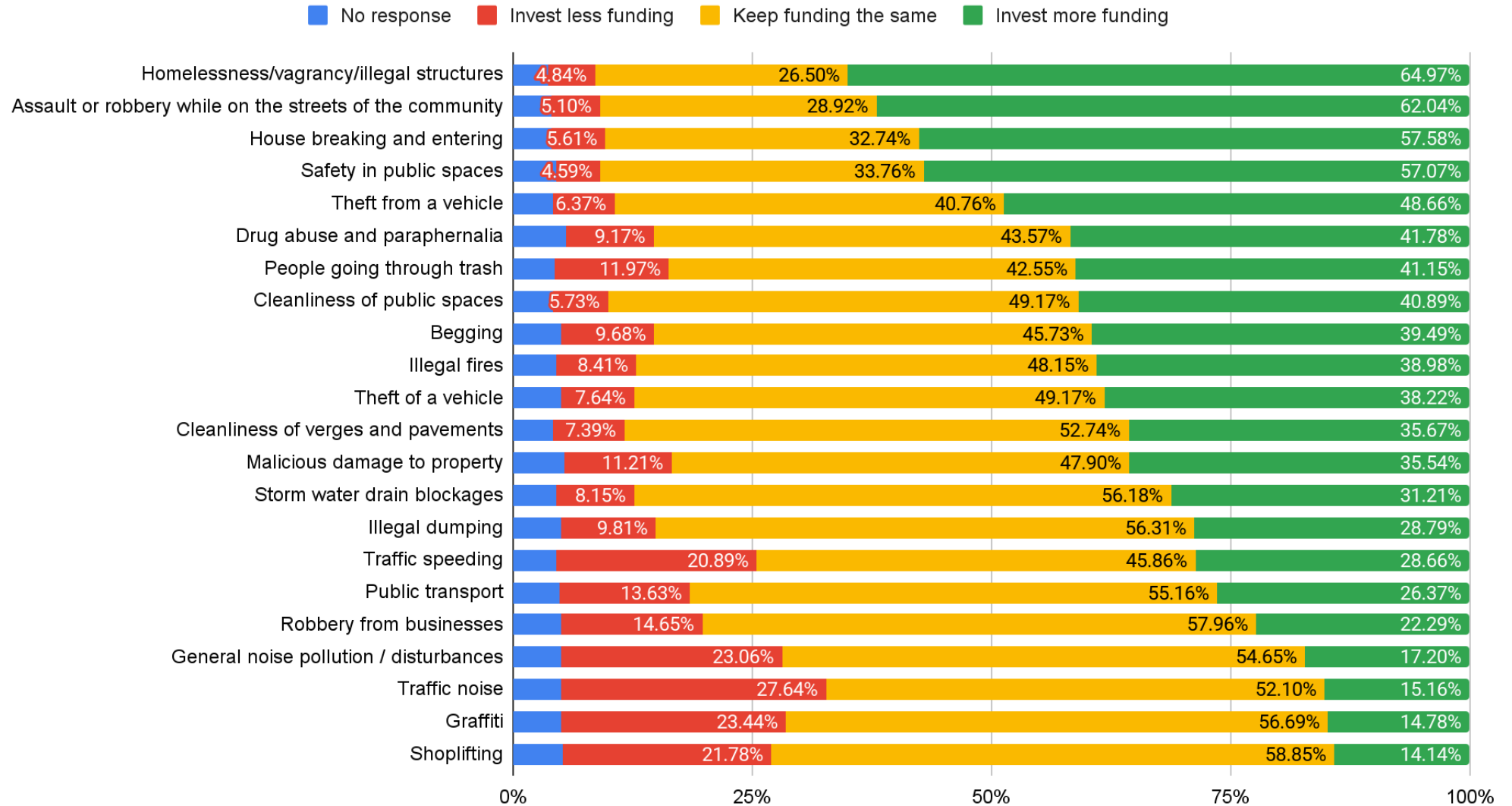
This question is similar to the question asking respondents to rank their concerns about various issues. However, it differs in that it asks respondents about which issues should receive less, the same, or more funding.

Note: the source of funding in these questions is not specified. The funding could be interpreted to be government or private (community) funds.

This helps to highlight areas for active investment, and areas in which the community would like to avoid (further) investment.

- 4 issues are priority areas for increased funding for at least half of respondents
 - Homelessness/vagrancy/illegal structures
 - Assault or robbery while on the streets of the community
 - House breaking and entering
 - Safety in public spaces
- 9 issues are priority areas for increased funding for one third to half of respondents
 - Theft from a vehicle
 - Drug abuse and paraphernalia
 - People going through trash
 - Cleanliness of public spaces
 - Begging
 - Illegal fires
 - Theft of a vehicle
 - Cleanliness of verges and pavements
 - Malicious damage to property
- 4 issues stand out with a particular focus on reduced funding by about a quarter of respondents
 - General noise pollution / disturbances
 - Traffic noise
 - Graffiti
 - Shoplifting

Funding of concerns



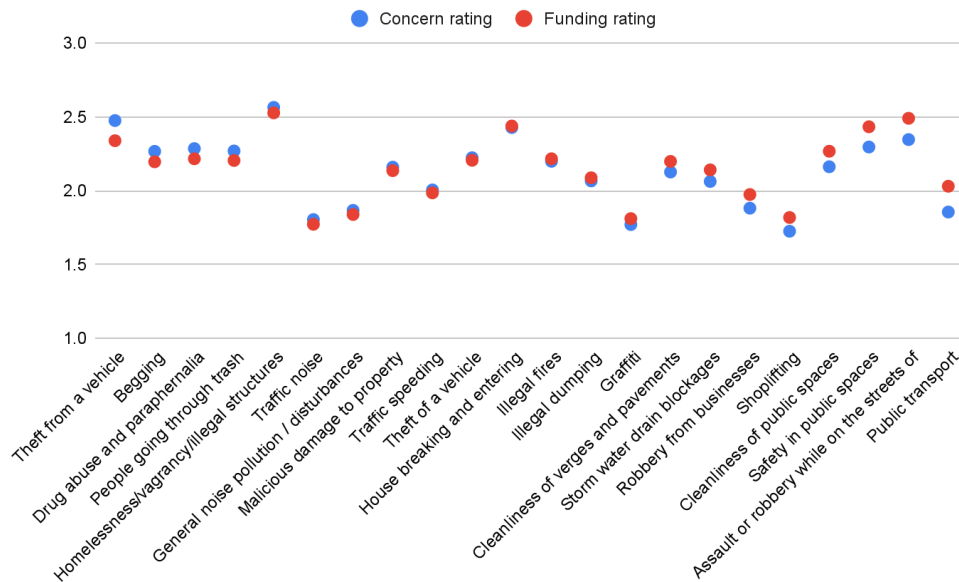
4.8 Concerns vs funding

A rating score is calculated for concerns and funding issues. Concerns are rated from 1 (not concerned) to 5 (very concerned) and then normalised to a scale of 1 (not concerned) to 3 (concerned). Funding issues are rated 1 (invest less funding) to 3 (invest more funding). Issues can then be compared by ratings and rankings to identify issues where concerns and funding priorities are different.

- The concern issues and funding issues are not significantly different in terms of ratings.
- The two issues which have slightly higher variance are:
 - Assault or robbery while on the streets of the community: Marginally higher rating for greater funding than for concern
 - Public transport: Marginally higher rating for greater funding than for concern

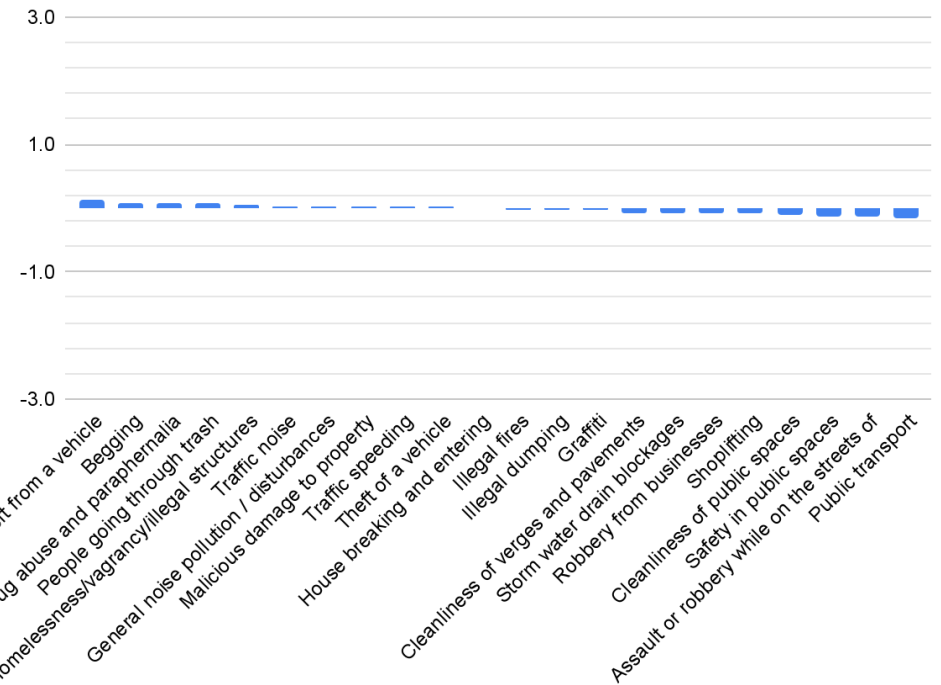
Concern rating vs funding rating (1-3)

4.9 Ranking of issues

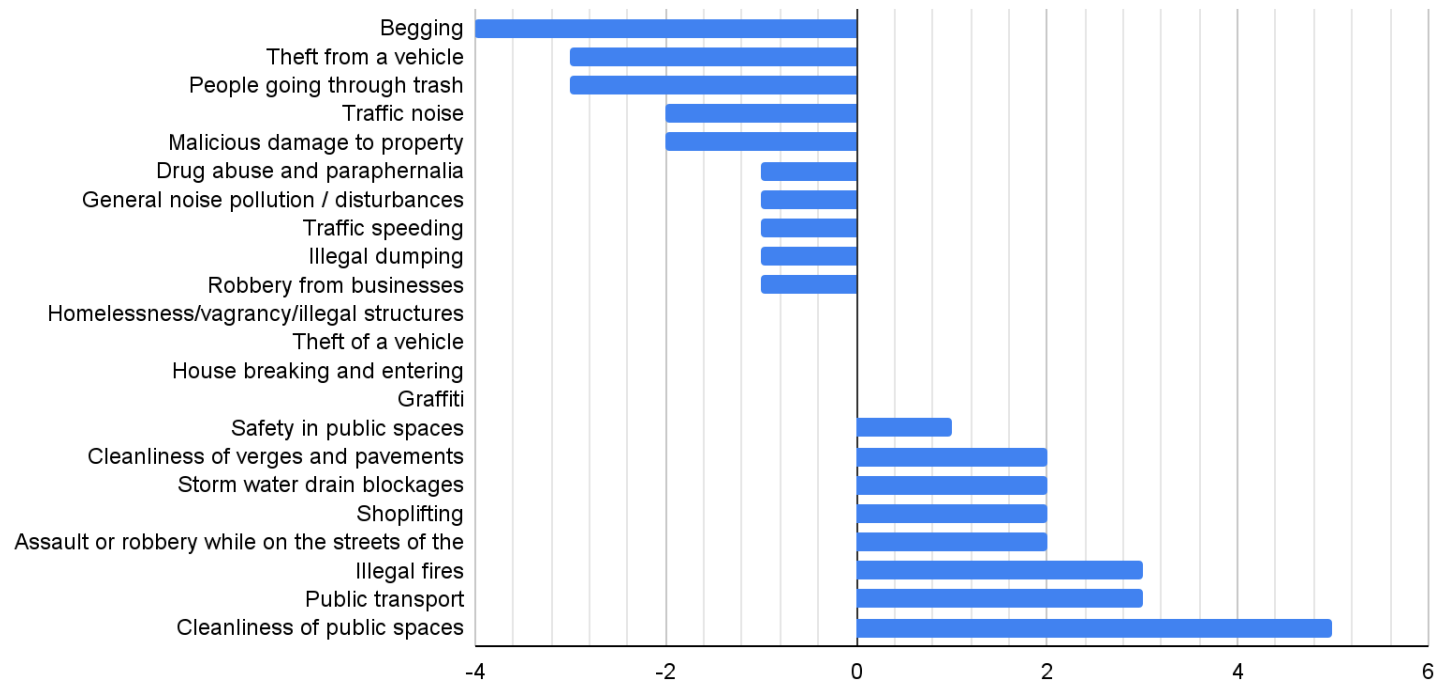
The issues can be ranked by their concern rating, where a rank of 1 is the issue with the highest concern.

The difference between the ranking of the concern for an issue, and the funding for that issue, helps to highlight differences:

- Negative ranking difference: issues for which there is a relatively greater concern than a desire for funding
 - These tend to be issues which would be resolved if funding were invested in related issues (e.g. reducing homelessness would reduce begging)
- Positive ranking difference: issues for which there is a relatively greater desire for funding than concern
 - These tend to be issues which are dwarfed by other concerns, but rate relatively higher in funding priorities

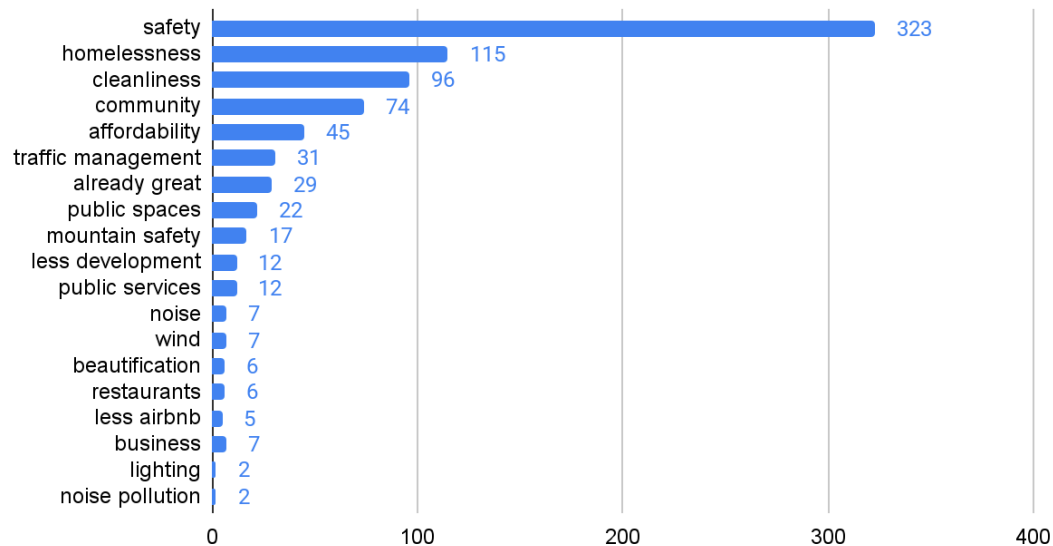

What would make this the best neighbourhood?

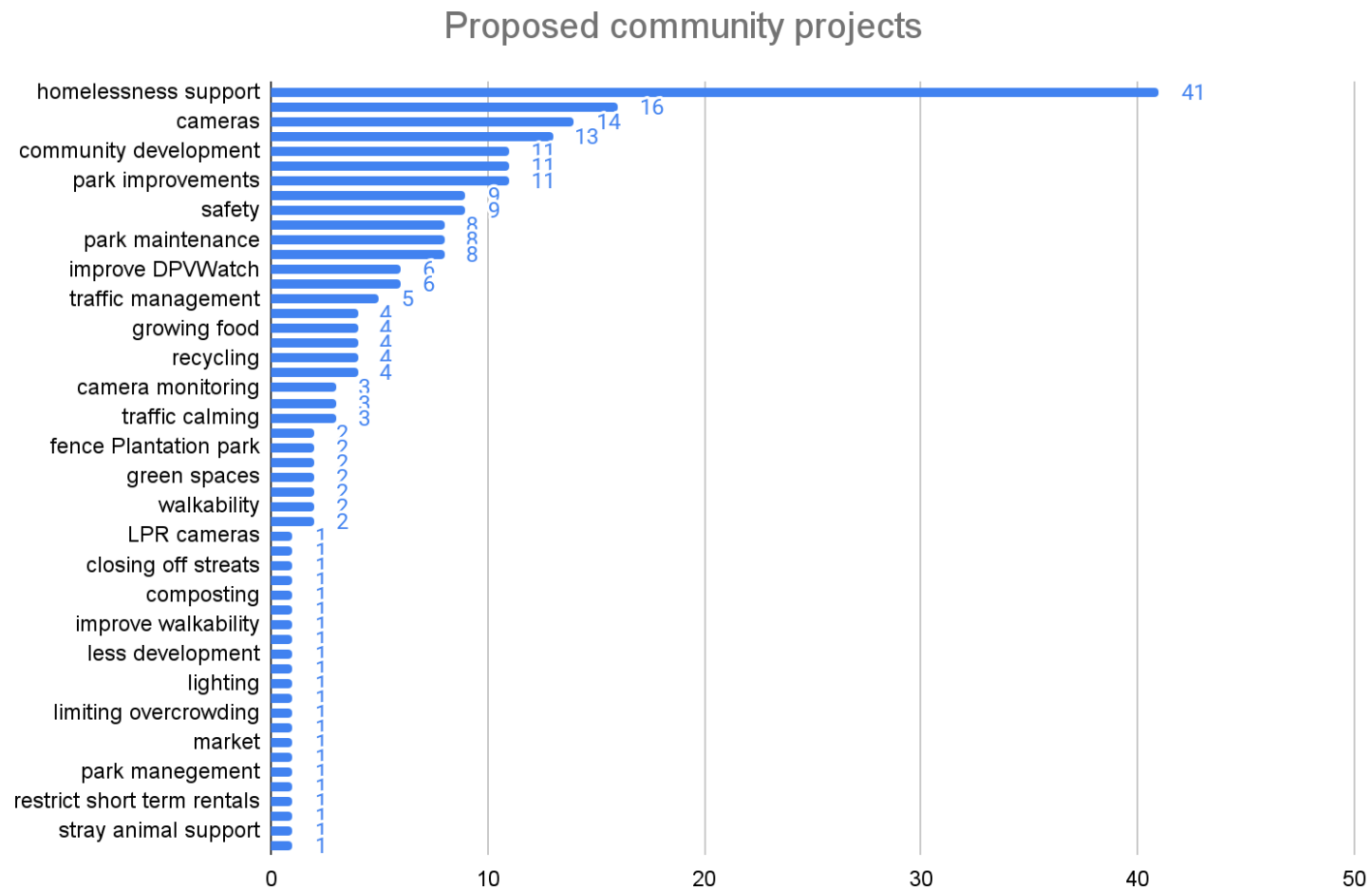

The Public Participation provisions of the Western Cape CID By law (Provincial Gazette Extraordinary 8743, 13 April 2023) set out mandatory criteria for a valid public participation process. Section 6(2)(e) explicitly requires that: “Venues for prescribed public meetings [must be] located within the proposed district, or as otherwise approved by the Executive Director.” The current arrangement does not comply with this requirement for the following reasons: The meeting venue is not located within the proposed district, contrary to section 6(2)(e). There is no indication that the Executive Director has granted approval for an alternative venue outside the district, as required by the by law. Holding the meeting outside the district creates barriers to participation, particularly for residents, property owners, and businesses who are directly affected and who may not have the means or ability to travel to an external venue. This approach is inconsistent with the by law’s requirement that the public participation plan must be “cognizant of the needs and characteristics of the local community” (section 6(2)). The deviation undermines the integrity and accessibility of the public participation process, which is a mandatory prerequisite for the determination of a CID. Request for Remedial Action In light of the above, I request that: The current meeting arrangements be declared non compliant, and A new meeting be scheduled at a neutral venue located within the proposed district, as required by section 6(2)(e), unless a lawful exemption has been granted and published. The applicant be required to amend and resubmit the public participation plan to ensure full compliance with section 6 of the by law. Until these defects are remedied, the public participation process cannot be considered valid, fair, or compliant with the governing legislation. 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29	This is a wonderful idea, but I have some qualms about my own position. The house is valued at 6.7 m. or thereabouts. I am the usufructuary of the property in terms of the trust. I am retired and a pensioner with a relatively small pension, and considering my medical expenses, I am not able to pay more for the property than I do already - the rates account is generally between R8 000 and R 9 000, and to pay this, I am having to eat into my ever-decreasing savings. I understand that a trust cannot request a rebate from the City Council. There must be others in the suburb who are in the same situation as I, and I wonder if any consideration could be offered to to me and any others. 30	1. Shift change staggering — patrol vehicles I'd suggest considering two different shift-end times for the two patrol vehicles (e.g. Vehicle 1 changes at 17:00, Vehicle 2 at 18:00). The goal is not to control how other services manage their own rosters, but to ensure that the CID's patrol shift changes do not coincide with the existing shift change times of Armed Response, Law Enforcement, or SAPS. A brief gap in all services simultaneously is worth avoiding where it's within our control. The business plan notes that shift structures will be managed by the patrol service provider in compliance with employment regulations, but the CID should specify in the service-level agreement that shift handovers are staggered and do not create coverage gaps. 2. Law Enforcement Officer — weekend and after-hours coverage The business plan confirms that the Law Enforcement Officer is deployed on weekdays during standard working hours, but that the City can be requested to deploy them outside of these hours. A 9-to-5 weekday schedule leaves the area with significantly reduced formal enforcement support over weekends and evenings, which is precisely when many incidents occur. I'd recommend engaging the City early to explore whether a weekend shift — late or early — is feasible, even on a rotational basis. The limited availability of Metro Police resources during non-business hours makes this more important, not less. 3. Radio communications The business plan notes that CID staff will have a radio to communicate with patrol vehicles. I'd suggest we explore whether the DPVWatch radio channel can be used for CID communications or alternatively, approach Werner (DPVWatch Chair and the person managing radio frequencies in the area) about securing a dedicated frequency for the CID. Seamless communication between the control room, patrol vehicles, and DPVWatch is operationally essential. 4. Patrol vehicles — prisoner transport capability Both patrol vehicles should ideally be bakkies fitted with a secure compartment for the lawful transport of suspects. The current absence of this capability is a genuine operational constraint — without it, arrests cannot be followed through effectively. This should be included as a specification in the patrol service provider tender. 33	Thank you for hosting the public meeting. I want to begin by saying that I strongly support the broader CID initiative and appreciate the work being done to improve the neighbourhood. That said, I left the meeting strongly opposed to the proposal to fence the three parks at the entrance to Vredehoek, particularly at Aandbloem. For me, this is a visual representation of my only lingering concern about a CID: that it could default to making the neighbourhood feel more fortified/garrison rather than working toward a positive vision of safety, greening, beautification, and creative problem-solving, which is what I believe a CID is empowered and legislated to be. Aandbloem is quite literally the gateway to our neighbourhood, so the visual and symbolic impact matters. Vredehoek already feels overly fenced and lacking in greenery compared with neighbouring suburbs. By contrast, areas such as Lower Gardens and other nearby neighbourhoods seem to be moving in the opposite direction: greening public spaces, softening boundaries, and removing fencing where possible. That feels much more aligned with the promise of urban renewal and neighbourhood improvement. I would like to ask whether the committee is flexible on this issue. Would you be open to exploring alternatives, such as a planted or “green” boundary, landscaping interventions, improved lighting, cameras, or other solutions that address safety concerns without making the entrance to Vredehoek feel like a barrier? More directly, is the committee prepared to abandon the fencing proposal altogether if there is strong community concern? I am personally prepared to contribute funding toward beautification and native planting in this area, and I am not opposed to safety interventions such as cameras or security presence in this important entry point. However, I feel strongly that fencing is fundamentally the wrong approach for this location. I raise this because I genuinely want to support the CID, but the fencing proposal gives me pause. I would love to see the committee take a more creative approach here, one that reflects shared values of greening, openness, beautification, safety, and care for the public realm. I do hope you will reply in order to win my support, and to take me up on the offer to contribute to an alternative solution. I think it should be put to all attendees at the meeting by show of hands who would be willing to pay R75 per million instead of the proposed R61 for even better security coverage either by way of 24 hour patrols in 2 vehicles or additional security patrollers? My flat's value at this time is R2,250,000 therefore I would be paying approximately R152 a month if the CID were to be established. 2. I am presently employed part time but am almost 79 years of age (yes, and still working!) but the firm I work for is winding down and I will probably be unemployed in a year's time. Then I will be living off interest on savings. I will not be able to afford R152+ a month then. I will apply for a Rates rebate as my income will be drastically reduced. I sold my house and bought this flat in order to downsize so that I would have money for my retirement years. However with the rate of galloping inflation I will be no better off once I cease working. 3. I STRENUOUSLY OBJECT to people saying it is a small amount comparable to eating out, a week's groceries, "money is nothing when you are dead" (one woman's comment). The money I have saved/invested for my old age is what I have to LIVE ON, while I am ALIVE! 4. I NEVER eat out, I NEVER entertain since years ago, I hardly ever GO OUT, I don't sit at cafes in the evenings. I object STRONGLY to people commenting on other people's income. I agree with the comments of older people who say they cannot afford it. I do not see why we have to do the job the City Council should be doing, i.e.. cleaning streets, fixing damaged pavements, weeds, public spaces etc. I find that if one logs a service with the City, the problem gets sorted quite quickly. Our block has a caretaker who cleans the area outside around our block and the block next to us I have even seen their caretaker mowing the grass outside adjacent to the pavement, which is the job of the City. Our block has high fencing, electric fencing and I am fortunate to have off-street parking. In 4 years of living in this apartment block I have only once seen a car (actually it was a pick up truck) broken into. Most times cars are broken into due to negligence of owners leaving items visible inside. 47	4. We are situated at 34 pinoak road right at the end of the street in the circle, with our north and east side perimeter facing the mountain buffer land. It is literally a motorway off vagrancy and a litany of misdemeanours happening in front of our very eyes on a daily basis, leading to attempted or realised crimes varying from theft from gardens even when dogs are there sometimes!, break-ins of cars (twice for my neighbour at no 36 in one month or so in April /may 2026) or houses, epic poaching of proteas and other protected flora. I once even chased and successfully stopped 3 guys from taking a tortoise from the slope. 5. Whilst we have now the Sugarbird NGO cutting down aliens, my husband spent years cutting down thousands of aliens on the slopes to have more visibility against vagrants trying to sleep amongst the trees. We contacted TMNP for authorisation to poison aliens after cutting but were refused. We were left with aliens growing rapidly again and still no help. On top of this there is the unbelievable littering of the slope between dewaal drive (PK) and our houses/mountain path, the littering and occupation of the Murray and Stewart quarry. I have spent 22 years cleaning the litter from the mountain slope, even one memorable 1st January! Every Wednesday after Bin collection it is the same: Vagrants come and pick bins and leave our street mostly through the mountain slope downwards. They often seat on the grass, out of the view of most residents(but we can see them due to our position) and start selecting what they took out of bins and want to keep and leaving behind what they don't want. 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	They also eat stuff and leave the containers etc. All this leading to us clearing the litter every week with no help from the municipality or TMNP. The grassy ridges by the entrance of Murray and Stewart quarry are sometimes overloaded with litter, excrements and condoms etc as it is a popular place for sleeping and living in summer. My husband and I have cleaned the quarry and its slopes and ridges for 20 years, sometimes collecting 2 rolley bins at a time and we feel that nothing will ever change as we are not protected from what is happening on the slope and mountain. Which leads me to my last point: 6. If you are going to erect a fence to protect lower gardens but this project does not include for a fence from the end of the High Cape 2 Complex along PK drive to - say – pass the shooting quarry, you will not be protecting Devils peak from anything. Multiple fires have been started because people have no restriction whatsoever to their destructive behaviour. Let me give you a last example: On Christmas day, i.e. December 2025 a fire was started. My husband and I were walking down the slope coming back from a dog walk as the smoke became obvious. We passed a man with suspicious behaviour and immediately felt that he was suspect but also that surely we should not jumped to conclusion. However, houses along the slopes had actually filmed him starting the fire and less than 2 hours later when we consulted our street group, we found out that it was the right man. He came from PK drive and escaped toward Deer park if I remember well. With no certitude that a fence will be erected at PK drive limits, by the high cape 2 complex, I can guarantee that we will not vote for CID even though I am in favour of it. I can also confirm that nobody in our street will vote for it as we have a Security Guard scheme and as people see it during our discussions on group, is that it will bring us no added advantages. Please also note the situation that we are in. A bit like a ‘no man’s land’ – a hot potato between municipal area and TMNP land where no one takes responsibility.					
48	Supportive resident raised a specific safety concern involving a person sleeping rough around Derry Street, Wexford Park, the library and the quarry. Since then, the property valuation has increased 50-fold to R10.75m – with the monthly rates correspondingly increasing to R6 271. Unfortunately, our monthly income has not grown close to the same rate and has been capped since we've become pensioners, with the result that we barely break even each month. The additional R650 monthly Vredehoek CID levy (based on the valuation of our property) will push us beyond our budget limit and we will have to sell our house if this is enforced. In addition, this is more than 3 times higher than the R189 average monthly levy envisaged for the CID. 54	The proposed boundaries of the CID enclose properties with very diverse profiles and different needs and concerns. It covers a large area – about 4sqkm - with properties against Table Mountain about 2km away from properties on Philip Kgosana Drive. I would please like to request the Steering committee to reconsider the boundaries to exclude the area previously identified as Highlands Estate - above Highlands Avenue, between Van Riebeeck Park and Disa Park. In the CID Business Plan the area is described as follows: “Vredehoek is not a suburban community of large properties and high fences. Most properties are modest, face directly onto the street, and have limited off-street parking.” This description is completely the opposite of our properties bordering on Table Mountain, namely: Large properties with high fences (many electrified) and off-street parking. Most residents here struggle to meet the rising cost of rates based on soaring valuations of the modest properties they bought many decades ago, which are now valued around R10m. Many of the owners are pensioners on fixed incomes – not eligible for rebates, as has been suggested. Most have armed response and alarms because our main safety concern is home invasions and armed burglaries by organised gangs coming across the mountain - which many experienced. We do not experience Vredehoek as having a “a strong community feel” as described in the Business Plan. 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	I was repeatedly told to “get out of Vredehoek” by a gentleman who added that he does not want to inhabit the same planet as me, never mind the same suburb, because I said we will be paying three times the average CID rate based on our house valuation of more than R10m (missing the point I made about unaffordability) for services with little benefit to us. Another lady called me “entitled” because I said I didn’t know where the parks were that will be fenced by CID – On Google Maps Plantation Park is about 2km from where we live – but Van Riebeeck Park, which we border on, had been excluded from the CID. I was labelled selfish because we have armed response and “not know the fear of being confronted by criminals on the street”. Not true, we got armed response because: During a home invasion our family was held at gun point for about 1½ hours while the so-called “mountain gang” (because they invade from Table Mountain and escape over the mountain) ransacked our house; our front door and security gate was kicked in by another organised gang who was luckily interrupted; burglars entered our house at night and were scared off by our dog; two more attempted burglaries were foiled and intruders were chased from our property on more than one occasion. These perpetrators arrived from, and escaped via, Table Mountain, avoiding roads that can be patrolled by CID vehicles, which made armed response an absolute necessity. We therefore do not experience Vredehoek as particularly “walkable” as described in the Business Plan, especially not at night when we lock ourselves in our houses and switch on alarms. I would therefore like to request that you have another look at the boundaries and consider excluding our area (mentioned above) that does not fit your CID profile.					
55	The budget allocation and Business Plan emphasis does not align with the needs and wishes expressed by respondents to the Urban Management Survey. We do not believe that enough thought – and budget planning – have gone into addressing the issues that concern residents. The main concerns, homelessness and dire poverty, are extremely complex issues faced by authorities worldwide, which cannot be solved by vehicle patrols or one or two social workers. The responses to the Urban Management Survey showed that only 26% of the respondents felt unsafe (37% feel safe, 37% are neutral, and 26% feel unsafe). Could this relative low concern be because 85% of houses (43% of apartments) have armed response, plus 19% are considering getting it in the next year? Despite the fact that only about a quarter of the respondents feel unsafe, the CID Business Plan claims that “very few respondents feel completely safe, or not safe at all” and more than 50% (R3 710 450) of the CID budget for the first year will be allocated to address “Public Safety” concerns. The next highest budget allocation will be for CID Management admin (salaries, office, repairs etc.) namely 31% (R2 211 122). On the other hand, “Addressing Homelessness” - and resultant issues like begging, people going through trash, etc. - that have been flagged as major concerns in the Urban Management Survey - will only receive 5% of the proposed budget (R336 960). “Maintenance and cleaning” and “Environmental development” of public spaces, including fencing – identified as other major concerns for residents – will respectively receive R408 244 (6%) and R396 000 (6%). 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	The 219 respondents who identified community projects that they felt were important, indicated that safety issues were third on the list with 34 mentions (15%). The main community projects they highlighted related to environmental development and public spaces at 29% (63 mentions of which 8 were about Plantation Park specifically), followed by homelessness issues at 26% (56 mentions of which 8 were about the Stroompie informal settlement specifically.) By specifically mentioning the Stroompie informal settlement and the fencing of Plantation Park, shows that these problems are important to a very specific area. This is supported by the budget allocated to improving and fencing parks in the same area, which will not benefit the broader community. There is only scant reference to "illegal fires" (linked to homelessness). Yet, one of the greatest dangers us homeowners bordering on Table Mountain face are regular mountain fires started naturally (sun on glass), accidentally by picnickers, deliberately by arsonists, and irresponsibly by illegal sleepers on the mountain. Once again, not a danger that a CID can protect us from. We do not oppose the formation of a CID, as we acknowledge that many property owners will benefit from it. We have sympathy for their concerns, which we experienced about 50 years ago in the 1970s when we moved into a semi-detached house in Upper Mill Street – e.g. theft from cars, muggings on the street, mess by bin pickers, homeless people and drug users in Deer Park, etc. and we would never have dreamt of walking the streets at night. But, we also believe that to be fair, resources and benefits should be shared equally throughout the community that will be paying for them.

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67	I have reviewed the CID business plan and would like to express my strong support for the proposed border security measures, including the installation of fencing along our border areas. As a resident of The Signal and an active DPV Neighbourhood Watch patroller, I have spent the past year regularly patrolling our border areas and green spaces. During this time, I have personally witnessed ongoing drug use, illegal fires, violent behaviour, illegal camping and sleeping, littering, as well as criminal activity along our borders and within the surrounding green spaces. Based on these firsthand observations, I fully support the proposed fencing opposite Jutland Park and extending along the entire border from Plantation Park, past the Jutland area, and through to Gardens. Restricting access by requiring people to enter and exit the Devil's Peak and Vredehoek area through monitored street access points, supported by strategically placed fencing, would, in my view, significantly improve public safety. It would reduce opportunities for criminal activity, help curb by-law infringements, and make it considerably easier for law enforcement and neighbourhood security teams to identify, monitor, and apprehend offenders entering or leaving the area. This submission is made in terms of: The Municipal Systems Act (MSA) The Municipal Property Rates Act (MPRA), The Promotion of Administrative Justice Act (PAJA), and The constitutional principles of legality, rationality, and fairness. The recent Western Cape High Court judgment declaring the City's value based service charges unlawful has direct implications for the CID model, which relies on the same impermissible charging mechanism. Summary of Core Objection The proposed Vredehoek CID is legally defective, financially irrational, and administratively unsound because: CID levies are calculated using property values, which the High Court has ruled cannot be used to determine service charges. CIDs fund service functions (cleaning, security, maintenance), not general municipal governance. Therefore, CID levies are service tariffs, not property rates. Service tariffs may not be based on property value. The CID levy structure is therefore unlawful, unconstitutional, and invalid under the Court's reasoning. The CID proposal fails to meet statutory requirements for transparency, necessity, proportionality, and public participation. Legal Grounds for Objection The High Court's Judgment Applies Directly to CIDs The Court held that: Service charges must be based on usage or availability, not property value. Value based service charges become unlawful disguised property taxes. Municipalities may not create hybrid charges ("part tariff, part tax"). VAT may not be charged on property rates. Any charge based on property value must strictly comply with the MPRA. CID levies suffer from the same defects identified by the Court. 75	Good day I am a resident of Ludlow Road, a busy thoroughfare in Vredehoek. The main cause of the deterioration of my and my family's quality of life over the past two years or so is the unchecked increase in the noise produced by cars (many illegally 'enhanced ') and motorcycles that drive up and down our road at all hours. The problematic vehicles produce decibels that way exceed the allowable limit in terms of the city's by-laws. The driving of off-road motorcycles on municipal roads, which is against the law, is a particular source of noise and aggravation. I cannot understand why residents should be expected to put up with the pure selfishness displayed by these drivers, who show no regard for the impact of their actions on those around them, let alone consider that they are breaking the law. I have taken up this matter with the DVP Neighbourhood Watch but received no support. The only reason that I would support a CID in Vredehoek is if this disregard of the laws of our roads are actively addressed. However, I see no mention of this particular issue anywhere in the business plan. Until I do, I will not support a CID in Vredehoek because there would be no significant increase in my quality of life as a result. No homeless person in my area has had the same negative impact on my life as these drivers and the lack of law enforcement on our roads have had. I therefore request that this problem, which is increasing by the day, be addressed in the planning of a future CID. 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78	I hereby object to the Vredehoek CID for the following reasons: The CID tariff is yet another tax based on pre capital gains property value. As you are well aware - property value is determined by COCT and to have yet another punitive "wealth tax" added to a municipal bill is not fair and just. The CID Steering Committee has stated that the CID is a top service. Services should be charged based on usage and not on property value. Every property in the area targeted by the CID Steering Committee will most definitely not benefit the save value. Some will benefit more than others and the benefit will not be in proportion to the CID tariff paid per property. Our municipal rates and taxes are supposed to cover cleansing, servicing of public parks and spaces and already go towards social improvements for the homeless. One should not have to pay yet another fee to ensure that the above-mentioned services are delivered. The COCT should be taken to task to ensure that residents get the services that they pay for. Law enforcement that COCT keeps advertising is already paid for by our rates and taxes and should go towards ensuring that the safety and security of our neighbourhood is kept in check. I have spent after tax capital on securing my property without financial assistance from the state or the municipality. I contribute to our street camera monitoring project and 2 of my cameras facing the street are used to monitor for suspicious activity with CBAR as a response vehicle. Only 100 cameras will have their monitoring fees taken over by the CID. This will benefit only certain residents and opens the plan up to favouring only certain residents. Furthermore, excluding certain properties in Vredehoek (like Disa Park and High Cape) in order to skew votes in favour of a CID is not an approach that instils trust in the agents of the CID. There are many apartments in Vredehoek vs free standing properties. Clearly those with lower value properties won't pay a hefty fee at the current proposed rate. But higher value properties, who don't even qualify for a rates rebate and pay huge rates and taxes merely because of inflated property value stand to pay a hefty fee. The concern is looking forward to the future - with big increases in CID budgets as well as the compound effects of Valuations every few years - the increases are seriously concerning! The fact that those pushing for the CID are happy to enforce yet another tariff based on property value onto their very neighbours, just because "it's the only way", does not instil much faith and trust in the CID. The CID policies and bylaws are designed to be unfair. Clearly the "top up" services we end up paying for will free up our rates and taxes for the COCT to use elsewhere. They are already doing this - why make it easier for them to renage on their duties? 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	the COCT bylaws and policies can change at any time and often do not favour residents financially. I have the following questions: 1) Has the CID Steering Committee considered whether they will be happy to have funds go towards a COCT pot if another party other than the DA was in charge of Cape Town? Would you trust another in coming party to be the custodians of the CID funds? 2) What does the CID Steering Committee expect those living against the mountain to do if they find themselves having to finance another security initiative from off the mountain in the future? Would the CID free those residents from having to pay the existing CID fee and allow them to finance their own or create a CID for their own area? 3) Different areas of Vredehoek have different issues: those against PK drive and near lower mill have different issues to those up against the mountain. Those in Rocklands and backing onto Van Riebeeck Park have different issues to those living near Lazari and Villa Portuguese. It is clear that not all the various issues can be solved by one CID. A CID should reflect the whole community The proposed exclusion of High Cape and Disa Park appears inconsistent with the principle that a City Improvement District exists to improve shared public spaces and neighbourhood-wide safety. The benefits of enhanced public safety, cleaner streets and improved public environments extend beyond individual properties and are enjoyed by everyone living in and moving through the neighbourhood. The fact that certain developments already fund private security should not, in itself, justify exclusion from contributing to services that benefit the broader community. Many individual property owners similarly invest in private security while continuing to contribute towards collective neighbourhood initiatives. Excluding two substantial residential developments, on a questionable rationale, establishes a principle that is difficult to apply consistently and creates an inequitable distinction between different residential property owners. Including these areas would strengthen both the equity and affordability of the CID by ensuring that all beneficiaries contribute to the shared investment in Vredehoek. Affordability and financial guardrails for the future For the CID to be supported by individual households varying significantly in financial means, affordability must remain a central design principle. Given the wide variation in property values across Vredehoek, consideration should be given to mechanisms that provide greater protection for lower-value residential properties, such as a rateable-value rebate or other progressive levy structure. This would improve equity without undermining the financial viability of the CID. Similarly, property owners would benefit from greater certainty regarding future levy increases. Incorporating clear guardrails that limit annual levy increases to inflation, where any increase above inflation requires a specific consultation and approval process. Such measures would provide confidence in the long-term affordability of the CID. 5.
